Duplicates of the resolutions adopted at the mass meeting held Wednesday night in Page's hall, condemning the action of the board of public works for requesting the city council to remove the five-mile limit restriction for the disposal of garbage...

A committee appeared before the meeting asking an indorsement of the proposition to tunnel through the First street hill from Broadway to Fremont street. After some discussion, the proposition was unanimously indorsed.

Charles Farwell Edson addressed the meeting on "The City Beautiful." He pointed out that Los Angeles has more natural advantages and more material to work with than any other city...

"What has been done for civic improvement has been scattered," was Mr. Edson's first remark. "We must stop thinking of particular sections, and must get together working for the good of the whole."

In concluding, Mr. Edson said: "The value of things is in the amount of use which may be made of them. Make up your minds that you will have a city beautiful and that it will be of constant use to you and you will get it. Build for the future. Make the city do its real work, that is, make it a place where the workingman may earn an honest living for himself and his family..."

He is said to have sent an Indian into Wenger's saloon to buy liquor in order to obtain evidence.

The Indian and Rev. Mr. Smith, a local minister, were arrested and placed in jail with Van Wert.

Mayor Ingledue is a prominent member of the Order of Eagles.
