

GAYNOR SCORES FORMER FRIEND

CALLS RANDOLPH HEARST HARSH NAMES

"BELLOWING DEMAGOGUE" ALSO MAKES SPEECH

New York's Mayoralty Campaign Goes On Apace, with Numerous Incidents to Enliven the Contest

[By Associated Press.] NEW YORK, Oct. 20.—This was another night of whirlwind speech making in the municipal campaign, but the three candidates brought out nothing new in the way of personal attacks.

Mr. Hearst opened with an attack on Gaynor and Tammany, reviewing his efforts in behalf of the people through his newspapers.

"Bellowing Demagogue" Gaynor referred to Hearst as a bellowing demagogue who has never yet read the city charter.

Former Mayor Seth Low, a Republican, was one of the principal speakers at the Carnegie hall meeting.

Patrick H. McCarren, lying ill in St. Catherine's hospital, Brooklyn, is deposed from the Democratic leadership of that borough, according to a report tonight.

Insurgent, or anti-McCarren, borough tickets were withdrawn from the Brooklyn district by the understanding, according to rumor, that they were to cease their fight against McCarren on consideration of his being ousted.

The instructions, it is said, came directly from Charles F. Murphy, representative of the insurgent tickets called on the board of elections and requested that their names be left off the ballot.

This leaves the McCarren ticket alone in the field in Brooklyn, and while the move in one hand is said to have been the result of sympathy for Senator McCarren in his illness, one of McCarren's own lieutenants said tonight that the concessions made by the insurgents were the direct result of a deal to supplant him as leader.

POSTMASTER DROPS DEAD UNEXPECTEDLY

OFFICIAL AT THE CAPITAL DIES SUDDENLY

Man Who Came Into Limelight When He Ejected Woman from White House Expires of Heart Disease

WASHINGTON, Oct. 20.—Benjamin W. Barnes, postmaster of this city, and who served first as executive clerk under President McKinley and later as assistant secretary to President Roosevelt, dropped dead here tonight of heart failure.

Mr. Barnes had been in particularly good humor today over the fact that he had today been admitted to practice before the supreme court of the District of Columbia.

On at least two occasions Mr. Barnes came prominently into the limelight. One was at the time he was alleged to have played a part in ejecting Mrs. Minor Morris, a sister of Representative Hull of Iowa, from the White House. The event caused a sensation at the time.

President Roosevelt stood resolutely by Mr. Barnes and further emphasized his friendship by appointing him, about three and a half years ago, as postmaster.

A storm of protest was raised by Washingtonians against the appointment, the principal objection being that he was not a local man, although Mr. Barnes had lived here for about a quarter of a century.

Posse After Bank Robbers DAYTON, O., Oct. 20.—The police are searching for two men who entered the bank at West Manchester, twenty-five miles west of here, yesterday and attempted to hold up Cashier J. W. Leas. Leas fired two shots at the men, who ran. The robbers escaped in a buggy with a posse in pursuit. It is believed they made their way into Dayton.

Balloon Soars Over Vatican ROME, Oct. 20.—One of the Italian military dirigible balloons came from Bacciano to Rome, a distance of 13 miles in thirty minutes today. The dirigible executed evolutions over the city and passing over the garden of the vatican, was seen by the pope. The dirigible flew so low that its occupants could clearly be distinguished.

PURITY THEME OF CONVENTION

CONGRESS AT BURLINGTON URGES REFORMS

WOULD TEACH SEX RELATIONS IN PUBLIC SCHOOLS

Parents Declared to Be Responsible for Downfall of Children Through Neglect of Duty to Offspring

[By Associated Press.] BURLINGTON, Ia., Oct. 20.—The National Purity congress today considered strict law enforcement and suppression of vice in the larger cities of the country.

Miss Jessie Phelps advocated teaching sex relations in the public schools if parents did not do their duty in that respect.

Miss Ruth Ethel Smith, Beloit, Wis., declared that many cases showed that parents were responsible for downfall of their children through neglect to fortify the young minds against corrupt suggestions.

Dr. Horace Burdette of the Illinois vigilance committee said that the teaching of purity in the public schools should be made compulsory.

Volcano Breaks Out in Lower California FIRE AND SULPHUROUS FUMES EMITTED

EL CENTRO, CAL., Oct. 20.—News has been received here tonight of the breaking forth of a new volcano in the Volcano lake district, twenty-four miles below Calico in Lower California.

Flame and sulphurous fumes are emitted so that spectators can get near the new crater. Old mud volcanoes in this district have been covered with flood waters for several weeks. The volcano is not visible from Imperial valley, as Butte intervenes.

FIRE ENGINE SOON TO ARRIVE AT MONROVIA


Many Fires Within Past Few Months Have Forced City Council to Action. Apparatus Will Be Rented

MAXWELLS WERE FIRST MADE BY POOR MEN

Hardware Man and Employer of Olds Motor Car Company Started Business with Two-Cylinder Car

An interesting story of the early history of the Maxwell-Briscoe factory gives some striking sidelights on the remarkably rapid growth of the automobile industry.

"In July, 1903," said Fred J. Linz of the Maxwell company, "Benjamin Briscoe and J. D. Maxwell, the former in the retail hardware business in Detroit, the latter an employee of the R. E. Olds Motor Car company in Detroit—conceived the idea of going into the automobile manufacturing business.

"The first car was delivered in October, 1904. In November, 1904, four cars were delivered. In December, 1904, six cars were delivered. In addition to the touring car they decided to build a runabout of moderate price, which was put on the market with rapidity, and in January, 1905, thirteen cars were delivered.

"The company now has three big plants in various parts of the country. An extreme western plant is now being considered by the Maxwell-Briscoe Motor company."
