

PLAN TO FIGHT FRENCH TARIFF

DRASTIC MEASURES MAY BE ADOPTED

MAXIMUM RATE WAR SEEMS TO BE IMMINENT

President Empowered in Case of Discrimination to Prohibit Importation of Goods of Offending Nation

WASHINGTON, Oct. 20.—Drastic measures, including the exclusion of imports from any country unjustly discriminating against this country may be found necessary by the president should the United States adopt retaliatory tariff measures against France.

While so far this government has received no official information of the intention of France to operate a maximum tariff against this country upon the termination on October 31 of the commercial agreement, officials here are willing to admit there is some danger of the two countries applying their maximum rates against each other.

The exclusion power is furnished in section 5 of the tariff act of August 30, 1890.

This section empowers the president, in case American goods are unjustly discriminated against by any country, absolutely to prohibit the importation into the United States from that country of any article he may see fit to name.

PROMISES GIVEN BY ALDRICH TO FRANCE ARE TOLD IN BOOK

PARIS, Oct. 20.—The exact assurances given by Senator Aldrich during his recent talks with government officials regarding Franco-American tariff relations and with particular reference to the interpretation of section 2 of the new American tariff law, are revealed in a book out today.

M. Cruppi, former minister of commerce, who favors active French commercial expansion, in the book quotes Senator Aldrich as saying that President Taft's interpretation of "undue discrimination" did not mean that France must necessarily grant all her minimums but only that the treatment of American products "must be reciprocally just and reasonable" and that naturally it was expected that France would give the United States the same treatment as other active competitors in the matter of French trade.

M. Cruppi contends that the policy of negotiations is the commercial policy of the future and believes that the United States in her "splendid isolation" snaps her fingers at the world.

SCOTTISH RITES HOLD SESSION

Supreme Council Again in Convention

Knights of Court of Honor are Selected

WASHINGTON, Oct. 20.—The fifty-fourth session of the supreme council of Scottish Rite Masons for the southern jurisdiction resumed its labors today.

At the afternoon session the active members considered the report of the committee on nominations for honorary thirty-third degree Masons.

Grand Commander Richards announced on Friday that the thirty-third degree honorary would be conferred on those elected at today's session.

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Prince Ito visited the schools and factories here today and took luncheon at the Russian consulate. He also attended a dinner of welcome arranged by three hundred Japanese and Chinese residents.

Speaking at the dinner, Prince Ito reiterated that his visit in Manchuria was of a private character. He emphasized the importance of peace in the east and told his hearers that Japan would follow strictly the principle of the open door and equal opportunity, and expressed the hope that the Japanese of Manchuria would follow these precepts to the letter and co-operate with the Russians to the north in developing the country.

He expressed sympathy with the progressive policy consulate. He also said that the Japanese government was in duty bound to assist China in this development. He urged the necessity of the Chinese and Japanese avoiding differences and working together for the business development and peace of the east.

Heart failure is thought to have caused death. Mrs. Duke was the sister of Gen. John H. Morgan. She was socially prominent and an active member of the Daughters of the Confederacy.

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PARIS, Oct. 20.—The second International Pure Food congress entertained today petitions from the Natural Ice association of Massachusetts and other similar organizations in the United States, sharply protesting against the condemnation of natural ice at the Geneva congress last year.

The petitions were considered by a sub-committee, which subsequently reported a modification of the charges and setting forth that natural ice should be made only from water the purity of which was guaranteed by the sanitary authorities, and that the ice should be gathered, stored and shipped under conditions that would make contamination impossible.

A sub-committee reported in favor of permitting the use of small quantities of boracic acid as a preservative without indicating the presence of the same.

Another sub-committee reported in favor of requiring coffee with which chicory has been mixed, to be labeled as adulterated.

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Commissioner Blake decided to fix the bail at \$60,000. The preliminary hearing was then continued until October 27 and Allen was remanded to jail. His attorney had asked that bail be fixed at \$40,000.

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MRS. BATONYI GETS DIVORCE

TWO YEARS' FIGHT ENDS IN WIFE'S VICTORY

FAMOUS WHIP LOSES BATTLE AGAINST SPOUSE

Charges of Unfaithfulness Are Sustained by the Jury—Romance and Parental Objection Features of the Suit

NEW YORK, Oct. 20.—Mrs. Frances Burke-Roche-Batonyi was granted an absolute divorce today from Auriel Batonyi, the Austrian horseman.

This verdict follows upon two years of charge and counter-charge between the daughter of Frank Work, the New York millionaire, and Batonyi, who has been associated with wealthy horse fanciers since he came to this country in 1899.

Mrs. Batonyi sued for divorce upon statutory grounds, first alleging at least ten instances of unfaithfulness. At the trial, however, she withdrew all but two charges, therein involving her husband with two New York women.

A long night ride in a taxicab with one of the women, and a night spent in the apartment of another, were the allegations behind the charges.

It was during a coaching trip on the box of the public coach Good Times that Batonyi met Mrs. Burke-Roche, then divorced from her first husband, an English public man of some note. A brief courtship ended in August, 1905, in their marriage.

A year later the news was broken to Frank Work. The aged millionaire flew into a passion, it is said, and Batonyi alleges threatened that unless his daughter began steps to free herself from the union he would disinherit her.

Soon afterward an action for divorce was begun by Mrs. Batonyi. The husband retaliated by bringing a counter-suit in which he named eleven correspondents. He also sued his wife's father, her sister and her brother-in-law, her cousin and Mr. Work's confidential secretary, claiming \$1,500,000 for the alienation of his wife's affections. These actions are pending.
