COMMANDER MISS BOOTH TO OCCUPY PULPIT

WILL DELIVER HER WELL KNOWN LECTURE, "WONDERFUL"

Foremost Woman Orator Will Address Three Sunday Congregations, Morning, Afternoon and Evening, in Los Angeles

Miss Evangeline Booth, commander of the Salvation Army in the United States, will speak three times Sunday in the Temple auditorium, filling the pulpit for the two services of the Temple church as well as speaking at a special army rally and mass meeting in the afternoon.

Miss Booth, who is known as one of the foremost women orators, is well known in Los Angeles, and on her last visit in this city spoke in the Temple. At the morning service Miss Booth will preach a gospel sermon. In the evening she will deliver her well known lecture, "Wonderful." At the afternoon rally she will speak especially on "Christian Soldiers."

Dr. Blaisdell to Preach Dr. James A. Blaisdell of Beloit college, Beloit, Wis., who is being considered by the trustees of Pomona college for the office of president of that institution, will preach Sunday morning at the First Congregational church. In the evening Dr. William Horace Day, the pastor, will speak on "The Hidden Energy, or the Modern Quest for Ediciness." A week from Sunday evening Dr. Day will begin a series of evening sermons to young people. His first topic will be "How to Have a Good Time."


