It was "baby" day at the Broadway department store yesterday and nearly two thousand babies, from two bits of humanity to strong, lusty-lunged youngsters, with their mothers, guests of Arthur Lutz at his annual "doll tea."

It was a pretty scene as the babies seated about in a veritable toyland "goo-gooed" and clapped their tiny hands in expectation and admiration of the dolls and other toys dear to the hearts of youngsters.

For a few minutes there was a hush as the babies gazed with awe, mingled with fear and bashfulness, at the bewildering display, but soon the novelty wore away and the youngsters realized that the occasion was arranged for their benefit and entered into it with enthusiasm.

To many of the youngsters it was indeed a rare treat, the first time they had seen toys in such wonderful variety, or perhaps toys of any kind. After feasting their eyes on the large stock of dolls recently arrived from the east, the babies feasted on cookies and delicacies and sipped tea, while the mothers partook of light refreshments.

The happiest moment of their little lives was when each one was presented a toy as a souvenir of the Broadway department store's "doll tea."

ANTI-GAMBLING PETITION INDORSED BY CHURCHES

Vigorous Campaign for Signatures to Initiative Will Be Waged Throughout the City Today

The Church Federation yesterday started a vigorous campaign to obtain signatures for an initiative petition to secure the submission of the anti-gambling ordinance thrown overboard by the city council. Twenty-five of the churches with largest membership will have petition stands at today's services, and an effort will be made to secure 2500 signers by Wednesday night. To assure this, the Church Federation has secured the services of John P. Steele, who did remarkable work for the Municipal League in the recall campaign and for the consolidation committee in securing signatures.

The work today will be taken up by voluntary workers, but Mr. Steele will have a force of canvassers at work in all parts of the city Monday. The purpose of the ordinance is in part to effect a discontinuance of the practice of gambling by dice shaking at cigar stands.

ACCUSE COTTON CONCERNS OF VIOLATING TRUST LAW

Seventy-five Persons Implicated in Charges Brought by Grand Jury Against Oklahoma Concerns

GUTHRIE, Okla., Oct. 23.—Indictments were formally filed here today charging three of the largest cotton concerns of Oklahoma with alleged violations of the federal and state anti-trust laws. The defendants are the Houghton & Douglass company, W. H. Coyle company and the Lawton Cotton company, firms which control at least twelve other smaller corporations.


The indictments will, it is said, affect seventy-five persons, including some of the most prominent men in the state. They were returned following a grand jury investigation, which has been proceeding under the direction of Attorney General West, of Oklahoma.



INCENDIARY KILLED BY COUNTY OFFICER

Crazy Resident of Calaveras Who Fired Several Buildings Is Shot by Constable

STOCKTON, Cal., Oct. 23.—"Austrian John," a crazy resident of Calaveras county, who last Thursday burned his own house, then set fire to Stephens Bros.' store at Sheep Ranch, which was destroyed with a loss of \$3000, and set killed Friday by Constable Schwoerer of Murphys, who commanded the fugitive to halt.

After the Austrian had been hit with buckshot he tried to shoot the officer, and as he was dying he drank from a bottle of carbolio acid he carried. He terrorized the section in which he lived for several days and was overtaken in the brush.

He set the fires by saturating barley sacks with oil and had a supply on hand when killed.

Locates Father at Poor Farm TERRE HAUTE, Ind., Oct. 23.—A man killed recently by a train at Edwardsville, Ill., was supposed to have been Jacob Klein until a son of the latter was summoned. He found the dead man was not his father but later located the parent, whose whereabouts had been unknown to the family for fifteen years, at the county poor farm.

Socialists Win Seat

CORBURG, Germany, Oct. 23.—The Socialists won another seat in the Reichstag at yesterday's elections in this city, which had been regarded as a stronghold of the national-liberals. The turnover is attributed to dissatisfaction over new taxes.

MOTHER OF M'CARREN PROSTRATED BY DEATH

Aged Woman in Critical Condition as the Result of Senator's Demise

NEW YORK, Oct. 23.—The aged mother of State Senator Patrick H. McCarren collapsed today on learning of the death of her son, and this afternoon her physician said her condition was critical. Mrs. McCarren is 84 years old.

Keen interest in the choice of a leader of the Democratic party in Kings county to succeed McCarren arises from the general belief that Tammany will endeavor to gain control of the party's affairs in Brooklyn borough, which the senator had persistently fought.

CALIFORNIA ENGINEER TO CONSTRUCT ROAD IN CHILE

Railway Will Be Forty-five Miles Long and Will Extend from Coast to Mines

STOCKTON, Oct. 23.—W. H. Newell, the railroad engineer who was with the Sierra railway in Tuolumne county for a number of years, will leave tomorrow to build a railroad in Chile for the Braden Copper company.

The road will be forty-five miles long and will run from the coast in the state of O'Higgins to the mines, at an elevation of 8000 feet in the Andes. It will be narrow gauge and will be difficult work, owing to the grades to be met. Mr. Newell has been promoting a railroad from Stockton to Jenny Lind in Calaveras county, and says he will return to that work.

"MORE AIR IS NEEDED IN SCHOOLS," SAYS WOMAN

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 23.—In an address before the Philadelphia Teachers' association last night, Mrs. Ella Flagg Young, superintendent of the Chicago schools, laid particular stress upon the physical education of the child.

"Lack of forcefulness and strength of the average American child," she declared, "is due largely to want of fresh air in the school room."

She especially commended instruction of teachers in regard to the germ theory in tuberculosis, so that proper ventilating systems may be established and necessary preventive treatment taught the child. The introduction of manual training in elementary schools was also approved.
