

I. W. HELLMAN JOINS IMPROVEMENT CLUB

WELL KNOWN REAL ESTATE OWNER TO AID SOCIETY

Association of 160 Members Has for Object Betterment of Conditions in North End of Los Angeles

I. W. Hellman of San Francisco sent the North, Northeast and Northwest Improvement association \$20 and he well wishes the other day in reply to a request made by that body that he become a member of its organization. He was made an honorary member by the association.

The association has 160 members, 80 percent of whom are the largest property owners north of First street to the river. The organization has for its object the betterment of conditions materially in the north, northeast and northwest portions of the city.

On the reorganized committee on streets and boulevards are Walter S. Maxwell, chairman; Richmond Plant, Frank X. Pflinger, G. J. Long and Adolph Ramish. The new committee on public utilities consists of H. C. Thompson, Dr. J. H. Bullard, M. A. Pierce, Samuel Reece and D. K. Edwards.

At different matters presented at last night's meeting were the regrading and paving of New High street, from Temple street to Sunset boulevard; the main or ornament lights from Hill street to the viaduct, a first class driveway from Westlake park to Sunset boulevard, the paving of Lake Shore avenue from First street to Sunset and the widening of Lake Shore avenue to Echo park in conjunction with the paving.

It is also proposed by this association to open up California street from North Broadway to the federal building on New High street.

A petition has been started by the association to pave Norfolk street from First to Temple street. An effort will be made to have the renewal of the operation of cars to the foot of Temple street where the franchise calls for.

D. K. Edwards was appointed a committee to interview owners of vacant stores on North Main and Spring streets to eliminate the show signs.

President Mesmer gave a partial report in the matter of proposed elevated highway. He explained the advantages to this end of the city of possible connection with Boyle Heights and Brooklyn Heights to the north and east.

It was rumored among the association last night that I. W. Hellman will build a ten-story office building at the corner of Main and Commercial streets just as soon as the new federal building is completed.


