

SHORTAGE OF CARS FOR FREIGHT IS INCREASED

CHICAGO, Nov. 5.—The fortnightly statement of the American Railway association, on the car situation, issued today, says: "There has been an increase of 56 per cent in the shortages reported, which now total 35,636 cars. Of this number, 23,238 are box and 8743 gondolas. The surplus, however, shows a decrease of only 5081 cars, leaving 30,896, of which about one half are box cars. This surplus is principally in the Northwest, while the more serious shortages are in the east, the middle west and the southwest."
