SUGAR FRAUDS PROVE COSTLY

REFINING COMPANIES MAY PAY LARGE SUM

\$2,000,000 NOT ALL WHICH UNCLE SAM EXPECTS

Loeb Says System Inaugurated Since the Recent Revelations Precludes Possibility of Further Graft Among Weighers

NEW YORK, Nov. 22.—Because of a typographical error in the wording of the November indictment the federal grand jury found a new blanket indictment today charging conspiracy to defraud the government on alleged false weights of sugar importations against James E. Bestenagel, former superintendent, and Oliver Spitzer, former dock superintendent of the plant of the American Sugar Refining company in Brooklyn, and five government weighers.

(By Associated Press.) WASHINGTON, Nov. 22.—Collector Loeb of the port of New York conferred with the administration officials here today regarding the customs frauds.

Replying to inquiries, Mr. Loeb said that so far as the house cleaning in the New York customs house was concerned it was virtually at an end, but surveillance and closer watch over conditions would be maintained.

He intimated that the amount of money received from the American Sugar Refining company was by no means all that would be recovered eventually.

United States District Attorney Henry A. Wise of New York held a short conference with Attorney General Wickersham and the two adjost immediately afterward left for the treasury department where they were soon closeted with Secretary MacVeagh and Collector Loeb.

Institution of criminal prosecution against perpetrators of "sleeper trunk" customs frauds, with ramifications in all parts of the country, the pressing of existing indictments to avoid lapses under the statute of limitations, and the customs investigation generally were discussed at a conference in the treasury department today.

Secretary MacVeagh announced that the \$2,000,000 which the American Sugar Refining company had paid over to the government on account of evasion of duties, had been returned by the government as a complete settlement for all of its underweighing frauds, but that that amount affected no other evasions of duty and the government purposes to recover much more money as the result of frauds the so-called trust had committed.

After the conference Secretary MacVeagh stated to the press that the rules frauds overshadowing in interest one of the most important phases of the whole investigation—the commission of frauds by importers bringing in trunks with bottoms, involving losses to the government of millions of dollars.

Collector Loeb explained that where this had been possible under the present regime, which would preclude any such frauds in the future.

The sleeper trunk frauds whereby goods are brought into this country in trunks with false bottoms stretched by many parts of the United States, though passing only through the port of New York in cases about to be prosecuted.

Beyond the generalization of millions of dollars nobody officially can estimate the amount of taxes thus evaded. Most violators of the law in this respect are dressmakers. The government has much evidence to the contrary.

Sleeper Trunk Frauds Collector Loeb said today that the sleeper trunk frauds could no longer be carried on successfully under rules he has adopted.

These provide for a new stamp arrangement for trunks and in the limit of the time, the trunks remain on the docks. Henceforth the trunks cannot stay there long enough to be whisked away after nightfall. Instead, the government will stop the trunks away.

An honest standard for all steamship employes will be fixed. This will be effected through the companies by dismissal of men guilty of abetting frauds. Some cases already have developed in which the companies acted promptly.

Secretary MacVeagh declared today he had no knowledge of reported offers of \$600,000 and \$500,000 respectively, by independent sugar refining companies to the government to drop cases against them.

Edwin I. Anderson, a former employe of the American Sugar Refining company, who has made a claim on the treasury department for compensation for data he gave the government, called with his counsel. They talked with Secretary MacVeagh a few minutes and asked to see the papers. The schooner Edward Parr, who also has filed a claim. Parr's claim was refused by Assistant Secretary Reynolds two years ago on a ruling prohibiting customs employes from receiving any bonus.


Mr. MacVeagh declined to allow Anderson to see the papers.

MORPHINE USER WIELDS RAZOR OF FATAL LOVE

PHOENIX SCENE OF FIGHT WITH MANIAC

Policeman's Clothes Are Cut and Crowd of Men Have Strenuous Time in Capturing Insane Man

(By Associated Press.) PHOENIX, Ariz., Nov. 22.—William McMann, an insane morphine user; Alex. Kellogg, a mounted cowboy; City Marshal John Moore, Policemen Gaskin and Troutman, former Policeman Tip-ton and H. M. Mitchell, a mining man of Bisbee, engaged in an exciting street incident here today, in which McMann but Mitchell seriously with a razor, making four strokes, and he slashed the clothing of Policeman Gaskin, but failed to cut the flesh.

McMann rooms in the northern part of the city. Neighbors telephoned the police that the man was at large, wildly flourishing a razor and threatening everybody he met. The police responded quickly, but McMann eluded them by running down another street, and when overtaken he was in front of the postoffice in the central part of the town. Jumping into the street, he kept all at bay with the razor, though the officers in trying to rush him a time or two narrowly escaped the weapon.

One block farther, at Center and Adams streets, Alex. Kellogg, on horseback, threw a riata at McMann, but failed to capture him. While the fellow was cutting at the rope the police rushed in on him, but ineffectually. A planned and by the marshal, but he did not shoot, fearing he would injure bystanders.

Mitchell, observing the event from the sidewalk, ducked his head and ranged to the cheek bone, and the fourth cut was across the abdomen, though it only went through the clothing.

Kellogg by that time threw the rope a second time, caught McMann, spurred his horse and dragged the man several yards until he was thrown, when officers overpowered, disarmed and placed him in jail, raving mad and with part of a bottle of morphine in his pocket.

A local bartender says he recognized McMann as the son of a former fire chief of Los Angeles. Lately he has been employed around town as a day laborer.

Mitchell is a brother of George Mitchell, who is known all over the country, but especially in Arizona, Mexico and California as a mine promoter. Mitchell is not hurt fatally, although the wounds are severe and bled profusely. Mrs. Mitchell is with him.

HEAD OF YEE FAMILY IN SALT LAKE IS ALARMED

SALT LAKE, Utah, Nov. 22.—Alarm by a report that thirty hitchock men have been dispatched from San Francisco to wreak vengeance on members of the Yee tong in other cities, Yee Luke, head of the Yee family in Salt Lake, appealed to the police today for protection. The warning to the Yees came from Wing Hong Ching & Co. of San Francisco, who stated that the On Yick tong had hired a band of hitchocks to kill leading Yees in this and other localities. As a precautionary measure the police are interrogating all strange Chinese who arrive by train.
