WOMAN MARRIED, BUT REMAINS ON PAROLE CHARGED WITH FORGERY, LEAVES FOR WINDY CITY

Man Accused of Uttering Valueless Check Receives Transportation to Chicago

When the trial of Leon Charles Posey is called December 13 it is expected Posey will have shaken the dust of Los Angeles from his feet and will be bidding with the wintry winds of the Windy city. Posey, who is charged with forgery, was released on his own recognizance by Judge Willis yesterday. He explained his parents in Chicago had offered to pay his fare to that city if he could obtain his release. Judge Willis continued the case for trial until December 13, and if Posey fails to respond to his name then the matter probably will be dismissed.

POSEY WAS ACCUSED OF PASSING A CHECK FOR \$25 purporting to be signed July 22 by O. T. Posey, a wealthy mining man. The accused man, when arrested, alleged the mining man was his uncle, a statement denied by the latter. Later he said the check was given to him to cash by a stranger.

He left the country jail later in the day with a ticket to Chicago in his pocket.

Reed Trial Continued The preliminary examination of Etola Reed, charged with abducting her 4-year-old son, Dwayne Reed, from the home of her mother-in-law, where he was placed by Judge Wilbur, was continued indefinitely by Justice Summerfield yesterday, and the matter will probably come before the juvenile court on contempt proceedings.

TRUSTEES PETITION TO DISPOSE OF REAL ESTATE

Hearing on the contested petition of Elmer McDowell and A. W. McPherson, trustees in the J. W. Keating estate, for permission to sell all the realty of the estate for \$600,000, was begun before Judge Rives of the probate court yesterday and was continued until today.

The trustees' petition to be allowed to sell the estate's lots in Los Angeles and 700 acres in Orange and Los Angeles counties to H. G. Schader of Santa Monica and for a commission of \$32,000 to be paid to Carl F. Schader, brother of the purchaser, who negotiated the deal.

Schader yesterday raised his offer to \$600,000. The heirs claim the property sought to be sold is worth \$900,000 and are contesting the proposed sale.

Nichols Case Dismissed An agreement reached by attorneys representing respectively Mrs. Dorothy Nichols and her husband, Rev. W. T. Nichols, resulted yesterday in a dismissal in Judge House's court of the order to show cause why Nichols should not return to his wife their 2-year-old daughter, Norma.

The agreement means the child will be returned to her mother, to remain with her until the divorce proceedings instituted by Mrs. Nichols against Nichols on the ground of cruelty are finally adjudicated and the permanent custody of the child determined.

Placed on Probation W. A. Mattoon, who was sentenced to the city jail for thirty days by Police Judge Chambers last July and in whose case Judge Willis affirmed the decision of the lower court Friday, was relieved from a jail sentence yesterday, Judge Willis granting the application of Mattoon's attorney and placing him on probation for six months. Mattoon was charged with battery for running into F. W. Penrod with an automobile on Pico street July 5, 1909.


