

GIRL MURDERED FOR HER GEMS

ROBBERS TEAR DIAMONDS FROM HER EARS

CARBOLIC ACID FORCED DOWN VICTIM'S THROAT

Bandits Enter Room in Pittsburg, Kas., Where Young Woman is Sleeping, Choke and Poison Her, Then Flee

PITTSBURG, Kas., Dec. 4.—After a detailed investigation, the authorities tonight were unable to determine whether Miss Goldie Ingberg, the 20-year-old girl who met a mysterious death at her home early today, was murdered or committed suicide.

The police generally accept the theory that the girl killed herself, but physicians who examined the body are divided in opinion.

"They got my diamonds and then gave me poison," gasped the girl to her mother, who found her dying on the front porch of the home. Her lips were burned with acid. The diamond earrings were gone. Every circumstance pointed to murder. But the police advance another theory. The girl may have quarreled with the person who gave her the diamonds and returned them. Then in a fit of remorse she may have killed herself and in order to protect her family told the murder story.

If the girl was murdered her slayer entered the front bedroom, dragged her to the porch and after taking her diamonds poured acid down her throat.

PITTSBURG, Kas., Dec. 4.—Miss Goldie Ingberg was murdered and robbed at her home here early today. Her assailants forced carbolic acid down her throat, robbed her of her diamond earrings and then dragged her out on the front porch, where she was found later by her mother, who was awakened by her daughter's moans and calling.

Miss Ingberg's earrings had been torn from her ears. She lived but a short time after being found by her mother.

There is no clue to the identity of the murderers. Today's murder, following closely upon the killing of William Bork, his young wife and child a week ago, has renewed the excitement in this vicinity.

Miss Ingberg occupied a front bedroom somewhat isolated from the other portion of the house. Mrs. Ingberg was awakened by her daughter calling, "Mother! Mother!" Mrs. Ingberg hurried to the daughter's bedroom, but found the door from that room leading onto the porch open. Further search revealed the girl lying on the porch and barely able to say:

"They have my diamonds; gave me poison."

Miss Ingberg with difficulty told of two men having attacked her while she lay abed.

She said the men had poured carbolic acid into her mouth, then while one of the men placed his hand over her lips, they dragged her onto the porch and put the diamond earrings from their place.

Miss Ingberg soon lost consciousness and died without describing her assailants.

CULBERSON TO LEAVE CAUCUS

SENATOR WILL RESIGN AS CHAIRMAN

Money of Mississippi Mentioned as the Probable Successor to Texan Democrat—Expects Arduous Session of Congress

WASHINGTON, Dec. 4.—At the first conference of the Democratic members of the senate in the coming session of congress Senator Culberson will submit his resignation as chairman of the Democratic caucus.

This determination on the part of the Texan had been reached because of his serious illness, which probably will prevent him from attending the sessions of the senate for at least two or three weeks.

In a letter to Senator Money signifying his intention to resign, Senator Culberson says:

"As you and all my Democratic associates know, I have not been at all well for nearly a year. Last March I had a severe attack of the grippe. Without taking the necessary rest from such an attack, I remained in Washington in attendance upon the senate throughout the recent extra session."

"The result was that I continued ill during all the session, and at its close I was much reduced in strength and vitality. From this I have not recovered in the comparatively short vacation which I have been able to take."

"The approaching session of congress promises to be a long, exacting and arduous one, and in my present condition I do not feel that I should undertake the extra duties which will devolve upon the chairman of our caucus. It probably would retard or prevent my early and full restoration to health."

Senator Culberson succeeded Senator Blackburn as chairman of the caucus. In discussing his probable successor, several senators today expressed the opinion that Senator Money of Mississippi, vice chairman of the caucus, would be chosen.

ST. PAUL, Minn., Dec. 4.—A continued issuance of diametrically opposite statements from railroad and strike headquarters marked the progress of the switchmen's strike tonight.

To the statement of General Manager J. M. Gruber of the Great Northern that all the available strike breakers are not needed on account of so many old men returning to work, President Hawley of the switchmen's union replied that only two men have returned to work in the Twin cities, one of them a switch tender and the other a yardmaster.

To the railroad's statement that conditions at all points are normal or are rapidly becoming so, President Hawley said not a switch engine has moved at the Minnesota transfer, the pivotal point.

day conducting negotiations with Chicago railroad officials, declined to discuss in detail the published reports that the roads of the country are on the verge of a great labor war.

"It is misleading to say the trainmen's organization has made demands for increased wages from the roads," he said today. "The proposition for an increase of wages on the lines east of Chicago has been referred by the officials of the organization to the men themselves. There are at least 75,000 interested, and each man must consider the proposition of the demand for more wages and vote on it before any such demand can be made."

"It will take some time for the decision of the men to be registered, and until then the situation cannot be regarded as acute."

CHARGES AGAINST ST. CROIX ARE CREW TO BE DELAYED

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 4.—United States District Attorney Robert Devlin announced today that he would not issue complaints charging perjury against certain members of the crew of the burned steamer St. Croix until the termination of the inquiry into the burning of the vessel now being held before United States inspectors.

The district attorney declares he does not wish to embarrass the inspectors in their findings by instituting criminal proceedings before they have arrived at a decision.

If Captain Warner of the St. Croix swears to a complaint later the matter will be brought to the attention of the United States grand jury now in session here.
