S. P. REMINDED FORCIBLY OF DEPOT STIPULATION

PROMISE TO BUILD NEW ARCADE STATION IGNORED

E. C. Calvin Asked to Tell Los Angeles What Imperial Valley Troubles Have to Do with Grant on Fifth Street

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nothing in the way of actual accomplishment can ever be expected. These are strong words—they may not be handled with a gloved diplomatic hand, as was your carefully arranged, meaningless reply. But they fit the situation. "As was stated to President Harrison in the original communication, the expenditure in Imperial valley by the Southern Pacific company, and Harrison's statement at the chamber of commerce meeting that he would build the depot as outlined when the Imperial valley expenditures were returned by the government, have no connection with the matter at all, and your company knows it as well as do the people of Los Angeles, every one of whom, so far as your committee knows, is of the opinion that the refund should be made. In advertising to the Imperial valley, you speak of the benefit that the people of Los Angeles receive from the development of that section, but even granting that, is it to be assumed that the Southern Pacific company had not a single thought of its own interests when it entered that fertile valley and expended great sums of money to maintain its interests there?"

"As to your policy of retrenchment, limitation of expenditures and also exclusion of the plea of the San Francisco fire several years since, these things also are beside the question, as you clearly know."

Statement is Remarkable

"But the most remarkable effort to cover up the situation is your statement, and we quote it literally:

"While this ordinance took immediate effect as a matter of law, still it had no practical effect, and will have none until the new depot is constructed, for the reason that it is necessary to allow the public full use of this portion of East Fifth street until the same is occupied by a new building as it is the only means of access to the present depot. The public, therefore, by the vacation of East Fifth street, has not lost any benefit enjoyed from its existence as a street, and will not do so until the depot is constructed."

"You must have indeed smiled all over yourself, Mr. Calvin, when you penned that statement, for you know your company knows that, while you may permit a person or persons from time to time to walk, ride or drive over that property, that it has been handed over to you absolutely by the city of Los Angeles and that you possess it with all the rights and powers of a regularly constituted vendee—that is to say, a purchaser by regular deed—and if your company desired it might erect an impassable barrier across the west line of the property, prohibiting every manner of use by the public. It is not unusual to say that the company could not afford to do this. It certainly has the power so to do and you know it."

Word Should Be Kept

"The mayor of Los Angeles, the Hon. George Alexander, and Leslie R. Hewitt, city attorney, have, as you know, endeavored to impress upon your company that you do something at this late hour to at least approximately keep your word—in this sense I mean the company's word—for, as a matter of course, you simply carry out its orders. But no attention has been paid in a practical way to these direct representatives of our city, as nothing whatever that is material has been made in response to any other complaint since the property was ceded—and you know they have been many. "You also state in your reply that you will take pleasure in recommending that our petition be given as favorable consideration as possible under the circumstances. This, please bear in mind again, was written by you more than six months since. Assuming that you have made such recommendation, have you any information to give out as to why this promise has been violated? Do not consume your valuable time in dispatching to us additional perflage. What are you going to do?"

"It is not necessary for your committee to forward you a photograph of your old ramshackle building, as measure alike to life and limb, as you no doubt have been fully impressed with all the conditions under that head."

LONDON READY FOR HOT FIGHT

BRITISH PARTY LEADERS IN TRIM FOR WAR

NATIONAL ISSUES TO BE WELL PROMULGATED

Premier Asquith Plans to Take Active Part in Battle Between Peers and Commons—Socialism a Contention

will be one of the hardest fought in Great Britain. The leaders of both the big parties and of the Laborites and Nationalists have planned programs which make it a certainty that the people in every part of the country will hear the questions of the house of lords, tariff reform, free trade, Socialism and other side issues discussed from every point of view.

Premier Asquith will take an active part in the conflict. In addition to the big meeting to be held in London next Friday, at which all the members of the cabinet will be present, the premier will address meetings throughout the country. A. J. Balfour will be less active, but the younger men in the Unionist party are entering the campaign with enthusiasm.

The Labor party has arranged a series of demonstrations at industrial centers. The suffragettes, who have raised a big fund to oppose the Liberal candidates in every constituency,

have not disclosed their plan of campaign.

To Adopt Force Mrs. C. Despart, treasurer of the Woman's Freedom league, has announced she will no longer work with quiet methods, and in pursuance of its new policy will make voting impossible in certain districts.

The political suffragettes made themselves heard in two parts of the country this afternoon. They gathered in force at Southport, where Winston Spencer Churchill was speaking, and getting on the roof of the hall, shouted their battle cry for "votes for women," through the skylight.

Other women caused a serious affray at Leith, where Sir Edward Grey was speaking. Two suffragettes tried to force their way through the police lines and gain entrance to the theater where the meeting was held. They were joined by a rowdy element from the street and the police were compelled to charge them. Several persons were injured.

Sir Edward Grey said the Liberal party must assert not only the right of house of commons to be uncontrolled in the matter of finance, but must have candidates making it possible for a Liberal government to exist on fair and equal terms.

JUVENILES MOB MAN ACCUSED OF TAG THEFT

SACRAMENTO, Dec. 4.—A feature of Tag day in this city was the mobbing of William Dunn, a well dressed young man, who is accused of having stolen a 50-cent tag from a small boy.

The boy followed Dunn, shouting that he had been robbed, and snoring a hundred children were at his heels. The man dodged into a hotel which was surrounded by the juvenile mob, and when Dunn tried to escape from another door he was set upon by the crowd. The police rescued him. A friend paid for the tag and Dunn was released.

Not satisfied with that, he instructed his interrogator by reading the section in the penal code relating to criminal libel and told him how to proceed. The man was squelched, but the audience took care of the time allotted for his demonstration.

Several speakers paid their respects to the only argument now advanced by the machine—that "Republican supremacy" is paramount above all strictly municipal problems—and exposed the inconsistency and weakness of the Republican machine candidates in this respect.

The outpouring of enthusiasm and its deep-seatedness, as shown throughout the meeting, evidenced the determination existing in all parts of the city to see the entire good government ticket elected next Tuesday.

CHIPPEWA INDIANS ARE LOCATED IN NEW HOME

Chief Rockboy and 125 Braves Established in Blackfeet Reservation in Montana

WASHINGTON, Dec. 4.—Chief Rockboy and his band of 125 Chippewa Braves are officially at home in their new hunting grounds on the Blackfeet reservation in Montana and 1,300,000 acres in Valley county of that state which were withdrawn to make a home for the Indians have been reopened to settlement.

Rockboy and his tribe got a real example of rapid transit in Indian affairs. The department of the interior had intended to let them locate in Valley county near the Fort Peck reservation. Some of the white settlers protested, and the government became convinced the redmen would do better in a land where they could hunt and fish. November 1, Superintendent Logan of the Fort Belknap Indian school was instructed to find a new place for Rockboy and within two weeks he had them all on a special train speeding for the new hunting grounds on the Blackfeet reservation.

VETERAN NEWSPAPERMAN FOUND DEAD AT DESK

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 4.—Louis Werner, a veteran newspaper man of this city, was found dead at his desk at an early hour today with a tube from an open gas jet in his mouth.

Werner left a letter addressed to the coroner, stating that his act was due to financial troubles. The suicide was 62 years of age. He had been engaged in newspaper work here for many years.

ERDER'S DEATH TO BE PROBED

CORONER TO INVESTIGATE ALLEGED MURDER

ARSENIC SAID TO HAVE BEEN PLACED IN FOOT

Mrs. Dora Dixey, Accused of Poisoning Man, Declared by Police and Surgeon to Be Suffering from Collapse

ST. LOUIS, Dec. 4.—With Mrs. Dora E. Dixey in the St. Louis city jail under the care of the jail physician, announcement was made by the coroner late today that the inquiry into the death of William J. Erder will begin Monday.

The woman, who is accused of having killed Erder by administering arsenic in his foot, and Miss Kate Erder, sister of the dead man, who collected the evidence that moved the authorities to action, will be called to testify. Dr. Loren B. Doxy, husband of the prisoner, was not to be found tonight. He came to St. Louis with her this morning, but after he had been denied the privilege of remaining with her at the jail he walked from the building, and all efforts to discover his whereabouts have failed.

It is reported he was seen boarding a train at the Union station a few hours later, but whether he went back to Columbus, Neb., or to some point in Illinois is not known.

Mrs. Doxy is held practically incommunicado. The police declare that her supposed physical collapse is a sham, and in this they are supported by the jail physician.

Wife of Former Priest Dies

PARIS, Dec. 4.—Emile Jane Loysson, wife of the former priest, Charles Loysson, died today. She was born in New York in 1833, the daughter of Amory Butterfield. Her first husband was Captain Edwin R. Merman, an American. September 30, 1872, she was married in London to the then Father Loysson, the alliance attracting international attention.
