

DEPOSED HEAD OF PHENIX FIRM INDICTED George Sheldon, Former President of Fire Insurance Company, Is to Be Further Investigated by New York Inquirers

NEW YORK, Dec. 8.—George P. Sheldon, recently deposed as president of the Phoenix Insurance company of Brooklyn, who is critically ill at his home in Greenwich, Conn., was indicted by the grand jury for grand larceny in connection with the alleged looting of the fire insurance company's treasury to the extent of \$1,000,000 or more, today.

MILLION DOLLAR THEFTS CHARGED

As there has been no arrest in the case, the court records do not show the amount alleged to have been stolen from the insurance company.

GRAND JURY INDIGNANT OVER GOVERNOR'S ACTION OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla., Dec. 8.—The grand jury discharged yesterday by order of Governor Haskell, and thus prevented from continuing an investigation of the failure of the Columbia Bank and Trust company, today adopted resolutions expressing "supreme contempt for the methods resorted to by state and county officials to protect criminals" and commending Attorney General West for his "faithful, conscientious and fearless efforts to enforce the law."

Testimony Given According to an official, it was testified before the grand jury that Sheldon used the funds or credit of the insurance company in stock market transactions through a New York brokerage firm and pocketed the profits.

MYSTERIOUS JUDGE TIRED OF WORKING IN FACTORY Former Jurist Resigns Position in Button Factory on Account of Health

KENOSHA, Wis., Dec. 8.—The dream of former Judge Joseph R. Clarkson of finding happiness as a common worker in a factory is at an end. It is reported here that the judge, who went to work in a factory after his unusual disappearance and discovery last July, has resigned his position on account of his health.

STRICT CENSORSHIP BY ZELAYA DELAYS HIS LOSING FIGHT PANAMA, Dec. 8.—Passengers arriving here from Nicaragua state the people in that republic are kept in ignorance of what is happening in the country. So strict is the censorship maintained by Zelaya that residents of the western part of Nicaragua have not learned of the breaking off of diplomatic relations between the United States and Nicaragua.

Va., who was given an ice bath and painted red. It is alleged, because she "rooted" for the wrong football team recently.

Banker Spensley Arrested MADISON, Wis., Dec. 8.—Calvert Spensley, president of the defunct First National bank of Mineral Point, Wis., was arrested today at Mineral Point on an indictment charging him with irregularity in connection with the bank's affairs. He was brought to Madison, pleaded not guilty and was admitted to bail on a \$20,000 bond.
