

Stamps Cause Trouble

Large quantities of mail addressed to foreign countries is being sent to the dead letter office, according to the local postal officials, because the senders have attached Red Cross charity stamps to the packages. Mail bearing such stamps is refused by some foreign countries, and accordingly the postal authorities advise that when such stamps are used on international mail the address of the sender be plainly written on the letter or package.

This department is one of the most popular in the association, more than 400 women and children having enrolled since October 1. The program for this evening will consist of Swedish, German and American gymnastics, aesthetic movements, folk games and competitive games.

GRAND AVENUE LOT SELLS FOR \$55,000

Sale of Forty-five Feet South of Seventh Street Sets a New High Standard for Values in Vicinity

J. Harvey McCarthy has purchased for the Pioneer Investment and Trust company from Mrs. Julia C. Ivers, through the agency of R. A. Fowaa & Co., forty-five feet on the east side of Grand avenue, about 110 feet south of Seventh street, for a consideration of \$55,000.

The price paid, nearly \$1250 a front foot, sets a new high record for property in this vicinity.

The Pioneer Investment and Trust company will improve the property at once with a brick building to cost in the neighborhood of \$7000, plans for which are now being prepared by Dennis & Farwell.

It will be held by the company as a permanent investment.

SANTA FE WANTS TO BUILD PIER IN COLORADO RIVER

The Santa Fe railroad desires to build a pier into the center of the Colorado river east of Needles and under the protection of its bridge there. Application has been made to Lieutenant Charles T. Leeds, United States engineer in Los Angeles, for permission to build the pier. The war department requires that a public hearing be made on matters of this kind, and the government engineer has given notice that any protests may be heard at his office. The public hearing demanded by the government applies only to navigable waters.

FINISHES FOUR YEARS IN PRISON

MAN WHO AIDED SENSATIONAL ARREST RETURNS

Calls on the Sheriff, Whom He Aided in the Capture of Man Wanted Here on a Murder Charge

After four years spent in a Mexican prison, where he was subjected to cruel treatment and at one time was sentenced to be shot, Antonio Feliz reappeared in Los Angeles yesterday and made his first call at the office of Sheriff W. A. Hammel, who, while chief of police in 1902, he aided in the capture of Juan Pueblo. Feliz' reappearance recalls an event which at that time created interest throughout this country and Mexico and threatened disruption in the diplomatic relations between the two countries.

Pueblo killed Albundo Garcia in August, 1888, Santa Monica canyon in August, 1888, and disappeared until four years later, when he was located at Ensenada. He was arrested, but released by a local judge. Following his release he was lured by Feliz across the border line, where Sheriff Hammel, then chief of police, and another officer were waiting with an automobile. Pueblo was brought to Los Angeles, tried, convicted and sentenced to life imprisonment. A few years later he died in the penitentiary.

Feliz was arrested in Los Angeles on request of the Mexican authorities, who charged him with kidnaping. After a long fight in the courts and appeals to Washington, he was extradi-

ted to Mexico, where he was sentenced to be shot, the sentence afterward being commuted to life imprisonment. Sheriff Hammel succeeded in interesting influential men in behalf of the prisoner, and his sentence was finally reduced to four years, a fine of \$500, the latter being remitted.

Approves National Board

WASHINGTON, Dec. 9.—Speaking before the national council of commerce today, Secretary Nagel of the department of commerce and labor expressed his sympathy with the object of that organization and said he believed it would prove a valuable asset to the national government. Representatives of thirty commercial organizations throughout the country were present.

Liquor Dealers Indicted

KANSAS CITY, Dec. 9.—Fifty indictments were returned by the grand jury against wholesale liquor dealers, charging them with having violated the new law requiring wholesalers and manufacturers of liquors to pay a graduated tax to the state.
