EDELMAN SURPRISES MAYOR BY RESIGNING

DR. HAYNES MAY SERVE ON COMMISSION

Civil Service Board Members Say They Will Not Quit Office Until Their Terms Are Up

After serving nearly eight years on the civil service commission Dr. D. W. Edelman yesterday tendered his resignation as a commissioner to Mayor Alexander, to take effect at once.

The action of Dr. Edelman was a surprise to his colleagues on the commission. W. Ona Morton declared he had no intention of following the example, and expected to retain his place on the commission until his term expires, February 9, 1911.

When Mayor Alexander first took office he expressed a desire for the resignation of Dr. Edelman and Mr. Young because they were not in sympathy with his administration. They had assisted Harper in the recall and had expressed opposition to Alexander, but refused to resign their positions on the civil service commission.

SAN PEDRO CITIZENS REJOICING OVER BIG VICTORY OF ALEXANDER

SAN PEDRO, Dec. 9.—General satisfaction prevails here over the election of the engine Good Government ticket. The majority of 102 votes given Mayor Alexander in the four precincts formed in the city of San Pedro is recognized as a grand victory here. San Pedro had been claimed for Smith, and it was only the hard work of the San Pedro Good Government club that rolled up this majority.

The fact that 923 votes were cast against 553 on the consolidation election shows that the entire vote was gotten out. The showing was surprising. The showing made by the Alexander following, in precinct 192 359 votes were polled, Alexander receiving a majority of eighty.

Already the people are talking about the bond election in February. Since consolidation many new voters have moved into San Pedro and these are also enthusiastic for the harbor bond election. A restriction clerk is still here and an effort will be made to have every man entitled to vote registered in time.

Although it is hard to believe that any man living in San Pedro can vote against the proposed \$3,000,000 bond issue, this possibility may develop, and already steps are being taken to keep the matter from coming up. It is to get out the full vote when the election day comes.

NEW TRUNK LINE ROAD IS PLANNED TO TEXAS

Promoter in St. Louis Announces Project for Railway Through Arkansas and Oklahoma

ST. LOUIS, Dec. 9.—A new trunk line railroad from St. Louis to Texas, Arkansas and Oklahoma points is the project announced today by G. F. Moore, president of the recently organized Manufacturers' Railway of St. Louis.

Mr. Moore stated that efforts to obtain the co-operation of the Missouri, Oklahoma and Gulf, Midland Valley & Port Smith, and Western roads are under way. These roads have been feeders for the Missouri, Kansas & Texas, the Palo system and other southwestern trunk lines.

The construction of new terminals in St. Louis, a belt line about E. 8th St. Louis, Ill., and the operation of our ferries across the river are also indicated in the plans announced by Moore.
