LETTERS MAILED BY ROWELL AT STATION "C"

BROTHER-IN-LAW THINKS PROMOTER IS INSANE

Refuses to Reveal Contents of Letter, but Says 'His Conviction of Mental Disturbance is Strengthened'

Letters, mailed at postoffice station C, New High and Franklin streets, by Elmer Ellsworth Rowell, give assurance to friends of the missing man and officers who have been searching for him that he is still in hiding in Los Angeles.

Mr. Wilson would not reveal the contents of the letter, except to state that they only went further to assure him that Rowell is mentally unbalanced, a fact of which he has felt confident for a long time.
