

HOLLYWOOD IS DESIRABLE CITY

SUBURB WILL ADD TO FAME OF LOS ANGELES

HEAVY VOTE IN FAVOR OF ANNEXATION EXPECTED

In Meantime Foothill Town Is Making Extensive Improvements and Erecting School Buildings

Although Hollywood expects to be a part of Greater Los Angeles after the annexation election January 24, the bustling suburban city is going ahead with municipal improvements at a rate that will make her the most desirable addition that has ever sought union with the metropolis of South California.

Some of the attractions and improvements that Hollywood will bring into the greater city are:

An extremely desirable population of more than 5000.

An assessed valuation of more than \$1,000,000.

Two new schools to be built at a cost of \$130,000 in addition to what is already one of the finest public school systems in the south.

Further street improvements added to those already completed at a cost of more than \$1,000,000.

In the opinion of business men and realty experts of Los Angeles, the annexation of Hollywood will bring a more desirable citizenship and a proportionately greater property valuation than that of any suburb now included within the city boundaries.

With the desire of Los Angeles to annex Hollywood and the eagerness of Hollywood to become a part of the greater city, it is apparent that unless unforeseen and unexpected opposition arises the vote on January 24 will be overwhelmingly in favor of the union.

Leaders in the annexation movement, however, fear that too much controversy may result in voters failing to go to the polls on election day, and they are urging on the people of Los Angeles the necessity of carrying the election and of getting out a vote that will indicate the desire of Los Angeles to welcome the beautiful little city of the foothills.


