SENATOR CUMMINS SAYS HE WILL WIN FIGHT

PROGRESSIVE ELEMENT BOUND TO TRIUMPH

Pledges Made by Republicans in Last Campaign Almost Forgotten in Councils, Declares Tariff Reformer

DES MOINES, Iowa, Jan. 1.—The fight for tariff revision and more progressive principles will go on more seriously than ever will win in the end.

Senator Cummins, the stand-patter, declared in an address here tonight at the Progressive Republican organization dinner.

Much interest attached to the senator's address, as it was regarded as furnishing the keynote for the progressive fight in this state. A large number heard his denunciation of the conservative element in the Republican party.

"With respect to the tariff," said Senator Cummins, the stand-patters feel it makes little if any difference how high the duties are if they are high enough to exclude importations. When they approach their subject their first, and I have sometimes thought their only, concern is for the producer.

"On the other hand the progressives remember that we promised the American people that the duties on imported commodities should be measured by the difference between the cost of production in this and rival lands and that we made the promise in order to give at once protection to the producer from unequal competition and protection to the consumer from extortion.

"We know that in many fields of industry home competition had been substantially destroyed, and we intend to subject our home products to the fire of foreign competition if prices were raised above a fair and reasonable profit.

"I do not attempt to obscure or to minimize the extent of our defeat, but if any one harbors the delusion that the passage of the recent tariff law ended the fight for fair and reasonable protective duties, he would be wise for him at once to reform his conclusion.

CAMPAIGN IN LONDON DULL

LIBERALS CONCEDE LOSS OF STRONGHOLDS

WORKINGMEN EXPECTED TO REJECT BURNS

List of Candidates Is Still Far from Complete—Three-Cornered Fight Threatened—Peers Attempt Vindication

LONDON, Jan. 1.—With the first pollings of the general election only a fortnight away the campaign shows less hope and excitement than the last stages of previous general elections.

Since the first tremendous uproar over the rejection of the budget by the house of lords and the general explosion of oratorical fireworks with a remarkable amount of personal abuse by rival politicians the contest has settled into a dull bombardment of speeches and newspaper articles dealing with the house of lords and tariff reform.

The list of candidates still is far from complete, while factional squabbles between reformers and free traders in the Unionist ranks forces the radicals and laborites in the government forces to leave many opportunities for changes in nominations already made in order to avoid three-cornered fights.

Have to Face Public

Taft Welcomes Common Folks

WASHINGTON, Jan. 1.—The event for which almost the first days of the republic has distinguished the celebration of the new year in Washington—the president's reception at the White House—took on a new interest today as the first public reception planned for the administration of Mr. Taft.

On New Year's day the White House doors swung open to the community, and during the appointed hours of the reception of citizens the poor and humble pass in review and receive the clasp of the chief executive on equal footing with the richest of the community.

Reception Large

Some idea of the magnitude to which the "New Year" reception at the White House has grown may be had from the fact that President Roosevelt, during the last two or three years of his term, attending a high-water mark of shaking hands with more than 8000 men and women.

Fifty a Minute

The president shook hands during part of the reception at the rate of forty to fifty persons a minute. When the reception ended at 1:55 p.m. the president had shaken hands with 5750 persons.
