ASKS COUNCIL TO LOWER RATE

PRICE OF ELECTRICITY TOO HIGH; IS CONTENTION

Federated Improvement Association Wishes City Rulers to Legislate on Basis of Material Reduction

Nearly a 50 per cent reduction in the electric lighting and power rate has been asked of the city council by the Federated Improvement association.

Friction between the city and the association over the electric supply rates, which has intermittently arisen in the past, has been much revived of late by the so-called "gentlemen's agreement" entered into by the old administration.

With the coming of a new city government, however, the Federated Improvement association assumes that the old agreement is nullified and renews its efforts for cheaper electricity.

ASSOCIATED CHARITIES ASKS \$5000 MORE YEARLY

'OLD LODGE' TALE HURRIES DIVORCE

MRS. MAUD V. MCGRARY SECURES DECREE

Long Beach Woman Became Suspicious When Husband Committed to Stay Out Every Night

"He told me the same old story about attending lodge meetings when he came home late," Maud McGrary declared in the divorce court yesterday.

JURY TO TRY GREEN HARD TO COMPLETE

Indications Are That Case Against Man Facing Fraud Charge Will Be Stubbornly Contested

Although ninety men were examined in a session that lasted all day in Police Judge Williams' court yesterday but eleven jurors were obtained to hear the evidence in the case of Earl Rogers and Job Harriman, who are charged with criminal conspiracy to defraud when court adjourned last night.

The case is the first of a number that have been brought against Green, the complainant being James Guinn, who alleges that Green sold him a half interest in a "real estate" office, 748 South Main street, for \$300.

Attorneys for each side put the tallies through a grueling examination, and although three panels of veniremen were examined but eleven accepted jurors were in the box when court adjourned.

The cases against Green will be stubbornly contested was indicated by the care used yesterday in selecting a jury. When first arraigned Green asked to be tried by the court, but he was refused and demanded a jury trial.
