EX-SECRETARY OF TREASURY UTTERS WARNING

**BRITONS INVENT LARGE FISH-LIKE, ARMY AIRSHIP**

LONDON, Feb. 12.—The British army appears at last to have secured a workable airship after many false starts. Manned by Colonel Capper and four assistants, the huge fish-shaped craft was launched from the military balloon factory at Farnborough today.

**ACCUSES 61 RAILROADS**

WASHINGTON, Feb. 12.—Sixty-one railway lines were made defendants today in a complaint filed with the Interstate Commerce commission by the McClelland River Lumber company of McClelland, Cal. The complainant asserts that through routes and joint rates on lumber from McClelland to points in other states are denied to it by the Southern Pacific, although other lines which are defendants in the proceeding are willing to make these routes and rates.

**DECLARES CONTRACTS ILLEGAL**

HARRISBURG, Pa., Feb. 12.—The state railroad commission in a decision announced today that the complaint of the Consolidated Telephone companies of Pennsylvania against the exclusive contract by the Bell Telephone company and the State Bell Telephone company of Slattington, Pa., rules that exclusive contracts are illegal and strongly recommends that there be an interference of local business.

**CHICAGO JUDGE DENOUNCES ROGUES' GALLERY PRACTICE**

Declares Detective Who Caused Boy to Be Photographed Should Be Held in Contempt

CHICAGO, Feb. 12.—"Mugging," as the system of photographing prisoners for the rogues' gallery is sometimes termed by police officers, received severe condemnation in the municipal court yesterday, when Judge Gemmill ordered Detective James McCarthy to show cause why he should not be adjudged in contempt of court for having caused Roy Whitmore, a student who had been fined \$5 for disorderly conduct, to be photographed and measured in the bureau of identification, using the words "outrageous and damnable" in referring to some of the methods resorted to by the police in the treatment of prisoners.

**POWERS REACH AGREEMENT**

PARIS, Feb. 12.—The foreign office announced today that the four protecting powers—France, Russia, Italy and Great Britain—had reached a complete agreement as to the representation to be made to Crete concerning the participation of the island in the forthcoming Greek parliament.

**JAPANESE BUDGET PASSED**

TOKYO, Feb. 12.—The budget was passed after slight additions by the house of representatives. The passage of the budget was assured through the recent compromise when the land tax was reduced 8 per cent, involving \$4,000,000, and the appropriations were proportionately decreased.

**BANDIT CHIEF DEAD**

TANGIER, Morocco, Feb. 12.—It is reported here that Raisuli, the governor of Djebala province and former Moorish bandit chief, is dead as the result of being poisoned.

**RUSSIAN LAWYERS TRIED**

ST. PETERSBURG, Feb. 12.—The trial began today of M. Basunoff and M. Aruson, prominent lawyers who were associated with Ostoy Pergament in the defense of Olga Stein, accused of embezzlement and forgeries. Madame Stein escaped to the United States in 1907, although she was subsequently returned here and sentenced to sixteen months' imprisonment. Following her conviction her counsel were accused of conniving at her escape from the country. Pergament died before the date set for his trial.

**ENJOINS HARVESTER TRUST**

TOPEKA, Kas., Feb. 12.—The supreme court today made a limited order against the International Harvester company, prohibiting it from making exclusive contracts with agents in Kansas, limiting territory, discriminating or destroying competition or doing other things which the attorney general held were violations of the anti-trust law.

**WOODROW WILSON SAILS**

NEW YORK, Feb. 12.—Dr. Woodrow Wilson, president of Princeton university, sailed today for Bermuda. He declined to discuss the situation at the university created by the withdrawal of the William Cooper Proctor \$500,000 gift.

**CATCH MANY HALIBUT**

TACOMA, Feb. 12.—The fishing steamer Seapora, operated by the International Fisheries company came in from the fishing banks with a record catch of halibut amounting to 240,000 pounds, valued at \$24,000 at present market prices.
