CHICAGO, March 25.—Chicago has lost its chance to vote on the saloon question at the election April 5, according to a decision by the election commissioners tonight.

TRIPLE FUNERAL TODAY

GALESBURG, Ill., March 25.—A triple funeral will take place here tomorrow as an outcome of the Rock Island wreck near Marshalltown, Ia., Monday. Shortly after receiving news of the death of her husband, H. T. Pennington, a child was born to Mrs. Pennington at Albert Lea, Ia. It lived but two days, and the mother died this morning. The three will be buried tomorrow.

FRANCE TO REVISE TARIFF

PARIS, March 25.—The senate, by a vote of 281 to 51, today concurred with the chamber of deputies in the adoption of the bill revising the tariff. A resolution was introduced requesting the government to collaborate with foreign nations in the creation of arbitrable commissions to settle international disputes.

DROUGHT KILLING CATTLE

BISBEE, Ariz., March 25.—Unless rain comes soon the loss to live stock in southern Arizona and northern Mexico will be severe. County Supervisor G. J. McCabe is back from a tour of inspection and says many cattle are dying now from lack of food.

WIFE MURDERER SENTENCED

BAKERSFIELD, Cal., March 25.—Charles C. Thompson, the first prisoner on record in Kern county to plead guilty to a charge of wife murder, today was sentenced to life imprisonment in San Quentin by Judge Bennett. Thompson shot his wife in a roadhouse, following their separation.

TWO NEGROES HANGED

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., March 25.—Joe Rogers and Jim Powell, negroes, were hanged here today for the murder of a negro merchant at Ensley, a suburb, a year and a half ago. Sheriff Higdon was badly injured while pulling the trap, his son cutting the string holding the lever.

THREE INJURED AT HOMESTAKE

LEAD, S. D., March 25.—Three men were injured by accidents in the Homestake mine today, and one was fatally hurt in the company's mill at Central City. Frank Harker, aged 19, son of Thomas S. Harker of Golden Gate, was caught in a bolt in the mill and so badly wounded that he died thirty minutes later.
