

INDICT MAN 'HIGH UP' IN PITTSBURG

DR. WATERS, HEALTH DIRECTOR, ALLEGED GRAFTER

Physician Is Accused of Taking \$1000 Bribe—91 Now in Jury's Corral with More to Come

PITTSBURG, March 30.—Dr. E. H. Waters, former president of the select council, now director of public health and charities, was today indicted as the alleged recipient of \$1000 in bribe money, and fifteen other former selectmen were named in the grand jury's report as having received amounts from \$500 to \$250.

The indictments make a total of ninety-one in two weeks, and there are more to come, says District Attorney Blakeley. The jury had before it today thirty more officials, directors and employees of the six banks alleged to have paid money to obtain an ordinance naming them as city depositories.



MEXICO CITY BANK OWES ONE CREDITOR \$5,089,012

This fact has become known through the disclosure of a claim filed in a branch of the civil court by the Canadian bank. The utmost secrecy surrounded the action.

SALT LAKE CITY, March 30.—Owing to rumors that an attack would be made on the county jail by a mob, Sheriff Sharp early this morning secretly removed three prisoners held on the charge of murder to the state penitentiary for safe keeping.

ROGERS' SON SWEARS OFF ASSESSMENT OF \$15,000,000

NEW YORK, March 30.—At the office of the board of taxes H. H. Rogers, son of the late H. H. Rogers, Standard Oil millionaire, swore off a \$15,000,000 assessment levied against his father's estate on the personal tax rolls of the department. He declared the bulk of the estate was invested in stocks and bonds exempt from taxation, and that the liabilities and debts exceeded the amount of taxable securities held.

CHARGES SISTERS GAVE HIS MOTHER LAUDANUM

SAN FRANCISCO, March 30.—In contesting the will of his mother, Charles I. Keefe charges his sisters, Mrs. May Denley and Elizabeth A. Keefe, with having administered whiskey and laudanum in large quantities to the decedent for years before her death, so they might be able to secure a will devising her property to them.
