CORPORATION TAX BILL IS AMENDED

WASHINGTON, April 1.—That the corporation tax law will be amended to restrict the operations of its publicity feature was virtually assured today when the house slightly amended a provision previously adopted by the senate for that purpose.

As passed by the house today, the law provides "all corporation tax returns shall be open to inspection only on the order of the president, under rules and regulations to be prescribed by the secretary of the treasury and approved by the president."

HOUSE FACTIONS PULL AND HAUL ON TAFT'S LAND BILL

Republicans Split on Administration Measure, and Democrats Oppose Both Sides

ASK PRESIDENT TO REPORT Minority Leaders Claim Proposed Legislation Is for Validating Past Withdrawals

WASHINGTON, April 1.—Three factions of the house committee on public lands today pulled and hauled at the administration bill for the withdrawal of public lands for conservation purposes.

Republicans from public land states, who object to any change in public land policies, and Republicans who are followers of the modern conservation program could not come to an agreement as between the two bills.

In the end the Democrats denounced both measures as being designed to give the present and past administrations clean bills of health in relation to the administration of the land laws. They then introduced a bill of their own.

Republicans were divided in support of the bill introduced in the senate by Mr. Nelson, which would give the president absolute authority to withdraw lands for conservation purposes, or for classification, and the bill introduced in the house by Mr. Pickett of Iowa, which would accomplish the same purpose and in addition validate all past withdrawals.

Both measures would remain in force until revoked by the president or by act of congress.

REPUBLICANS SEEK RECONCILIATION After the Democrats on the committee assailed the attitude of both factions of the Republicans, the latter attempted to reach an agreement, and it was reported tonight Mr. Pickett would consent to the elimination of that portion of his bill specifically validating past withdrawals by the interior department.

The latter clause, it is said, was intended to validate certain withdrawals made under the Roosevelt administration. It had been charged in debates on the floor of both houses that many of these withdrawals were without authority of law.

That contention was rejected by the senate committee on public lands, and the validating of past acts was declared to be unnecessary.

A statement issued by the Democratic members says their bill authorizes the president to make withdrawals of public lands for classification and other purposes, requires reports to be made to congress of the classification of withdrawn lands.

"The primary purpose of the administration bills relating to the withdrawals of public lands," it says, "seems to be to validate existing withdrawals and thus give the interior department and the administration a clean bill of health. While the withdrawal bill is to be labeled 'conservation,' it in fact accomplishes nothing toward that end, merely gives the president an express power which the interior department for many years has been exercising. No measure merely legalizing withdrawals is a true conservation measure."

"Classification is a primary and very important step toward intelligent handling of the public domain, and without it congress will be forced to proceed as in the past by permitting the interior department to perform functions that properly belong to congress."

HOUSE RECEIVES THREE RAILWAY BILL REPORTS

WASHINGTON, April 1.—Widely diverging views on control of common carriers, including a split minority presentation, are expressed in reports that accompanied the submission of the administration railroad bill to the house by the interstate commerce committee today.

The measure, drafted by Attorney General Wickersham at the instance of President Taft, introduced by Representative Townsend of Michigan and amended by the committee, is a substitute measure, already being debated in the senate.

In the house it probably will follow the naval appropriation bill, Chairman Mann of the committee, who will act as sponsor for the bill though opposed to some of its provisions, will seek on Monday to fix a date for the bill to be taken up.

The majority report, which Chairman Mann signed with the other Republican members, stamps the proposed legislation as even more important than any preceding acts for the control of railroads, imposing no undue interference with existing management and conferring large benefits upon the public.

The minority report, striking at the commerce court, declares "no untended, experimental legislation of doubtful constitutional character should be entered upon by congress at a time when neither consumers, shippers nor railroads are for such legislation."

The minority members, while earnest advocates of federal supervision of interstate railroads, attack the bill as paternalistic.

Still another set of views is presented by Messrs. Sims of Tennessee and Russell of Texas, Democratic members of the committee, who refused to sign the minority report although in favor of some of its features.

Mr. Richardson of Alabama, who signed the bill, is a strong supporter of the bill and will offer an amendment prescribing physical valuation instead of fluctuating value as a basis for such legislation.
