

Judge Lovett Accepts Invitation of Los Angeles Chamber of Commerce Guarantee Exonerates the Retailer

POSTPONEMENT REQUESTED DECISION COMING AT TRIAL

President Ripley of Santa Fe Unable to Attend Because of Business Accused Sellers of Garbled Products Put Blame on Relish Maker

According to word received yesterday by Secretary Frank Wiggins of the Los Angeles chamber of commerce, that body will not tender a public reception to Judge Robert Lovett, president of the Southern Pacific railroad, until Wednesday or Thursday of next week.

It is expected, from the telegram and from unofficial information at the local Southern Pacific offices, that Judge Lovett will arrive in Los Angeles this evening. He will probably go at once to the nearby tourist resorts for a few days.

He expressed himself as being sorry he could not attend the reception, but stated that it would be impossible for him to remain in Southern California almost a week longer.
