NEW YORK, April 4.—United States Judge La Combe today refused to punish the American Sugar Refining company for contempt of court. The government had asked that the corporation be declared in contempt for refusing to produce its books before the grand jury investigating the sugar underwriting frauds in response to a subpoena directed to the company and served upon its secretary, Charles R. Helke.

HOBSON MAY ASSIST STANTON OPPOSITION

'Hero of Merrimac' Says Rumor, to Stump State in Interest of Anti-Asiatics

It was reported in political circles yesterday that if Phil A. Stanton secures the regular Republican nomination for governor the Lincoln-Roosevelt league will arrange for Congressman Richmond P. Hobson of Alabama, former naval lieutenant and "Hero of the Merrimac," to stump the state on a platform opposing Asiatic immigration and attacking the so-called pro-Japanese plank on which it is charged Mr. Stanton expects to be nominated.

ALLEGED ASSAILANTS OF BANKER ARE ARRAIGNED

Youths Charged with Attempted Robbery in County Jail

Martin Kristovich and Lewis Valentine, who were arrested early Sunday morning on a charge of assault with intent to commit robbery preferred against them by John Lopizich, president of the International Savings bank, were arraigned before Justice Summerfield yesterday. Their preliminary hearing on the charge was set for 3 o'clock April 8. In default of \$200 bail each they were remanded to the county jail.

GRANT ELECTRIC FRANCHISE

An ordinance was adopted by the board of supervisors yesterday morning granting the Southern California Edison Electric company a franchise for electric wire transmission covering most of the eastern part of the county. The price paid for the franchise was \$1000. Heretofore the company has held a franchise for erecting poles and transmitting electricity over most of the county roads but it held no franchise for cross-roads. The franchise adopted yesterday allows it to right.
