PHILOSOPHY POOR FAITH SAYS KEANE

Declares Definite Religion Necessary in Order to Give Believers Information

"A church without a real presence doesn't compare with a temple of Jerusalem. There, at any rate, they heard the visitation of Jehovah and saw the signs of his good presence."

Bishop Keane spoke of the impossibility of an indifference to God, saying that the religion of indifference was a false principle.

"I must have a definite religion," said the bishop, "one that will give information on vital questions—what angers me, I care and whether I go. A religion of negatives and philosophies has no value. Life is a warfare, and the soldiers must not be mystified as to the commander's voice and want definite information."

"A religion cannot deny its history. If you are to judge Christianity by its history, then it is Catholic. It is continual in name and institutions. Do you think that a religion diluted in literature as volatile as the air, susceptible to changes of private opinion, would have met the difficulties met by the Catholic church? Think you it would have carried Christ in persecution and lifted the cross in pagan Rome?"

"Go back to the year 1590 and ask for the work of the Anglo-German Christianity. What power; where was it? As an organization it was not. The church of history is not Protestant. It is Catholic. A religious system to be Christian must have some connection with Christ. In order to reach London by cable the line must be intact. What of those 150 years when you had no connection, when no creed was known except the condemnation of private interpretation."

"It looks unkind to tell a man who professes to be a Christian that he is not. It seems hard, and I don't want to seem harsh. Kindness is not Christianity, but one of its fruits. I say in all charity that I am interested in your salvation. I ask you to look at facts. There is only one way of truth, and may we all come to him by faith in him."

"Catholicism is a living organization. It grows, but it does not lose its identity. She took all good people, laws and philosophy, and consecrated them to her use for the home of the eternal Emmanuel. She stands before the world creative because divine, beautiful because creative, new though unchanged."

"At the close of the lecture the bishop extended his thanks to Bishop Conaty, the Knights of Columbus, Dr. Glass and the press for kindnesses shown him."

SUFFRAGISTS TOLD THEY ARE LACKING COURAGE

Laura Clay, in Addressing Mass Meeting, Declares New Character Element Needed

WASHINGTON, April 17.—With only one man on the program, and he to offer prayer, five prominent women addressed a mass meeting of suffragists this afternoon.

It was a gathering incident to the national annual convention of the National American Woman Suffragist association. Rabbi Raymond Simon offered prayer at the beginning of the meeting, at which Rev. Anna H. Shaw, president of the American Woman Suffragist association, spoke.

Harriet May Mills of New York told of the work of the suffragists in the New York legislature. Beatrice Forbes-Robertson, a British suffragist, and Ella S. Stewart of Chicago, gave a classification of the opponents of woman suffrage.

While others spoke, Charlotte Perkins Gilman wrote poetry in behalf of the cause and then read it with the explanation she meant not to reflect on those who had preceded her, but intended none should go away and say they had heard nothing new on the subject.

The British and American classification of opponents of suffrage were radically different. According to the British speaker they were really divided into two classes: those who are prejudiced and those who believe it inexpedient to give votes to women.

The American classification put the opponents into three classes, designated as the ghosts, owls or hooters, and the complacent sinners. Among the ghosts, according to the speaker, were the "ghosts of the past," the "ghosts of the future," and the "ghosts of the present."

The association will elect officers tomorrow.

POLICE STOP MARATHON DANCERS AT SAN JOSE

SAN JOSE, April 17.—After they had danced nearly an hour and thirty-eight minutes, breaking the record for long distance dancing, a contest in which four San Joseans were the only survivors out of a list of twelve entrants was stopped by the police at the Auditorium rink late this evening. The women relayed with the various dancers, and because of this fact several San Joseans who had not entered had come prepared to dance with one partner. The survivors were Frank Perry, Fred Crofoot, William Herman and A. L. Cougle.

WOMAN, CALIFORNIA PIONEER OF '46, DEAD

SAN JOSE, April 17.—Mrs. Letitia M. Ryland, who crossed the plains to California in 1846, died here tonight. Mrs. Ryland was a daughter of Peter H. Burnett, first governor of California, and mother of two well known San Jose capitalists, Joseph and J. W. Ryland.
