MESERVE G. O. P.'S MAN FOR SENATE

Republican Leader Names Taft Believer Choice to Succeed Flint

PROSPECTIVE CANDIDATE MUM

"Programmer," Friend of Machine, Thought Strongest Opponent Works

BY T. SHELLY SUTTON "Edwin A. Meserve will be the Republican machine candidate for the United States senatorship to succeed Senator Flint."

So stated a prominent Republican yesterday, who, although actively identified with the regular branch of the Republican party in California, is protesting vigorously at the inner workings of the machine and who unhesitatingly has informed his friends that he will support Hiram W. Johnson for governor.

"I don't like the men the machine is lining up for this race and some of them I am not going to support," said this man yesterday. "I do not believe Stanton has the backing of the machine, but I believe it will support Curry. I have positive knowledge that the machine will launch Ed Meserve for the senatorship unless something comes up to prevent the present program. There is, of course, a possibility that Mr. Meserve will not agree to make the race, but I can't imagine such a thing."

For obvious reasons the man who made these statements yesterday imposed the obligation that his name should be withheld; but, shortly after the interview a reporter for The Herald called on Mr. Meserve in his office in the Los Angeles Trust building and asked him if he would become a candidate.

IS IN DOUBT

"I cannot answer that," he said. "It is too early yet. There has been a number of men, just like you, asking me the same question."

"You are aware your name is under consideration by certain of the Republicans?"

Mr. Meserve smiled.

"I have heard something to that effect."

"Would you accept their support and become a candidate, if offered to you?"

"I won't cross the bridge till I get to it."

"Will you refuse to become a candidate?"

RESIGNATION ENDS FIRE HOUSE FEUD

Commission Forces Negro Member of Loma Drive Station to Quit

IS BRANDED A DISTURBER

Long Row Between Man Accused and Lieut. Bright Is Given Airing

Because he threatened to "smash" Lieut. George Bright, his immediate superior in the Los Angeles fire department, W. R. Brown, a negro, was yesterday permitted to resign his position, the alternative offered him being immediate dismissal. Brown resigned, but protested throughout that he had never used the language attributed to him by the lieutenant. His own version of the encounter, however, differed only slightly from Bright's and the fire commission, with the mayor, evidently believed the service would be improved with him out of it.

Brown's resignation came as the result of charges filed by Lieut. Bright and which were followed by charges against the lieutenant signed by Brown and three other men attached to the Loma drive fire station over which Bright is in command. The fire commission went to the station yesterday afternoon and the entire squabble was threshed out without developing anything new or anything sensational.

HAS BEEN DISTURBER

Evidence introduced went to show that Brown had long been a disturbing factor; that he and Bright were quarreling much of the time and that discipline, under Bright, has been lax. At the close of the meeting Mayor Alexander took occasion to caution Lieutenant Bright that if matters in the Loma drive station do not improve at once a change will be made in the command. The station has only a chemical engine and all the men, including the lieutenant, are colored.

The wish of petitioners was heard faintly at yesterday's session of the commission, but the commissioners declined to follow up the line of questioning that developed it. Under the Harper administration Lieutenant Bright and Brown, quarreling then as they have been since, entered into a peace pact, shook hands and made up, with the Harper commission as witnesses to their reconciliation. This pact, however, was broken almost immediately.


