**GLENDALE PLANNING**  
**MAY TIME JAMBOREE**

Will Celebrate Completion of Municipal Lighting System with Holiday Pageant

An eastern May festival, flavored with a dash of the west and an old-fashioned barbecue with a typical last course—a Maypole dance—is what Glendale's board of trade and the recently organized Glendale and Vicinity Improvement association are planning for the afternoon and evening of May 14 to celebrate the completion and success of Glendale's municipal lighting system. Plans for the May festival were discussed a week ago. Yesterday President H. P. Coker of the Glendale board of trade and J. W. Usilton, president of the Improvement association, and committee members from both organizations met and received reports from members of the finance committee. It was decided to invite the women of the Tuesday Afternoon club to co-operate with the two commercial and civic organizations. At the conclusion of this meeting Chairman Coker placed the ban on political discussion, and said that the person mentioning real estate the day of the festival would be carried to the speaker's platform on a rail and com-

pelled to sing a song, dance a jig and take the negative side in a debate on the question of "Why is Glendale Progressive?" The principal feature is the Maypole dance. Features of this kind seldom are exploited on the stage in Southern California. It is the intention of the committee to invite the school children to participate in the Maypole dance, and to make it the prettiest feature in the program. Other amusements will include a ball game, a basket ball game, in which Glendale's High school girls' team will play; a fencing bout between Japanese swordsmen, egg, sack and potato races and a cake-walk, in which residents of Glendale will participate. Music will be furnished by the High School Glee club and two Los Angeles bands. Owners of automobiles and horse-drawn vehicles, sixty or more, have given the committee the use of their vehicles for that day, so that the visitors may be shown the beauties of Glendale valley. A plan to employ the services of a captive balloon to enable the guests to view the panorama of San Fernando valley is being considered. The barbecue committee has engaged the services of R. G. Doyle of Los Angeles, formerly a resident of Glendale, to cook the meat. The following committees were appointed by Chairman Coker: Finance, C. C. Pulliam, G. W. Watson, C. H. Allen and J. M. and buildings, William Anderson, E. W. Pack, C. H. Boyd and Harry Miller; transportation, J. M. Banker, secretary of the board of trade, and members of the following named firms: Pupper & Co., R. E. **SELLS-FLOTO CIRCUS**  
**LOS ANGELES BOUND**  
Two Trains Bearing Show Will Arrive April 27 for Two Days' Stay

**PUBLICITY FEATURE NOT TO GEN. CHAFFEE'S LIKING**  
'Forbids' Newspaper Men from Visiting Owens River

Guided by Gen. A. R. Chaffee of the board of public works the city council will inspect the aqueduct this week. The itinerary that has been arranged provides for leaving Los Angeles Tuesday night at 9:30 o'clock. A tourist sleeper will be attached to the regular train and will be switched to the California and Nevada line, which will take the party to Olancha, arriving there at 5 o'clock Wednesday evening. At Olancha the party will take auto to Independence, inspecting the aqueduct on the way Thursday and Friday. Saturday the Jawbone division and the cement plant at Monolith will be visited and then autos will carry the party to Mojave and from there along the line of the aqueduct to Los Angeles. **COURT ATTACHES PUZZLED OVER BELL CASE FEATURES**  
Principals in Three Corned Affair Tell Conflicting Stories

The case of F. M. Bell, charged with perjury, will go into the hands of the jury Monday morning, when Judge Davis delivers his final instructions. All the evidence and the arguments were heard at a night session in the court Friday. Attorneys who have followed the case from the beginning declare that it is almost unparalleled in the annals of the courts, and there is considerable speculation on the probable verdict of the jury. Bell still charges R. A. Sanger and O. P. Widaman with assaulting him with deadly weapons, although the case was dismissed nearly two years ago in the justice court, perjury being subsequently charged to Bell, on which he is just being tried. Sanger and Widaman charged Bell with assault with a deadly weapon, and on the stand all three told conflicting stories. It is a three-cornered affair, and even the court attaches, who are clever at deciding who are to blame in different charges aired, are completely mystified after hearing the evidence. **POINTS OF VIEW** "Does your wife object to late dinners?"
