Chico High Wins Interscholastic Meet at Stanford by a Single Point

Rice of Winning Team Sets Remarkable Marks in Shot and Hammer

STANFORD UNIVERSITY, April 23.—In a meet abounding in record-breaking performances, Chico high school won the fifth annual interscholastic track meet today with a total number of 17 points, barely scoring out Oakland high school, whose score was 15 points. The rest of the scores follow: Berkeley, 11; Los Angeles Polytechnic, 10; San Jose, 12; Lick high, 8; Alameda, 6; Los Angeles high, Hood River (Ore.) high and Healdsburg, 5 each; Fort Bragg, San Benito and San Mateo, 3 each; Harvard, Fremont, Mission high, Santa Barbara and Ventura, 1 each. Eight Stanford interscholastic records were broken and one tied. The most remarkable performances were those of Rich of Chico, who threw the 12-pound hammer 139 and 7 inches and the shot 49 feet 8 1/2 inches, setting new records in both events.

RECORDS SHATTERED Young of Healdsburg cleared the pole vault at 11 feet 7 1/2 inches, breaking Munn's record of 11.3 1/2. MacLise of Oakland, running the low hurdles in 25.3, broke Benson's record of 26.2.

HUESTON COMING BILLIARD WIZARD

Youthful Cue Expert Picked as a Wonder at Green Cloth Achievement

STUDYING BALK LINE GAME

Young Star Has Ambition to Secure All Titles—Will Meet De Oro

NEW YORK, April 23.—Thomas Hueston, the youthful cue expert, at various times holder of the world pool championship, and at various other times—including the present—owner of the world's three-cushion billiard title, is surely one of the wonders of the green-clothed table. Starting as a "kiddie" pool player, Hueston has developed into an expert at both cushion and balk-line in billiards. Such good judges as Maurice Daly and Jack Doyle predict that Hueston will be one of the world's masters at the most difficult game of billiards.

An opinion like this coming from Daly has set Hueston to thinking and working. No man ever knew the great Frank Love better than Daly, and the veteran says that Hueston has the stroke and the ability to execute that made Love a great player. As a majority of the foremost billiard stars began their careers as good pool players, Hueston will simply be following a well-trodden path.

Hueston has never appeared in public as a balk-line player, but some idea of his cleverness may be gained from the fact that in an exhibition game with Eddie Foy the other night he averaged 25 at 181, the toughest game in billiards. Hueston ran 22 points in the innings. Foy played 182 against Hueston and finished nowhere.

STRENGTH SURPRISING That Hueston is so strong at the balk-line game is a surprise to those who have known him only as a cushion player and a pool expert. It is his intention to practice balk-line steadily all summer, and, if possible, to work with a topnotcher like Willie Hoppe. He intends to enter the next championship 18.2 tournament, which will be played here next fall.

Some idea of the strong three-cushion game that the champion is playing these days may be obtained from a score he made in a three-cushion exhibition match with Jimmy Haire, the former metropolitan champion. Haire and Hueston got together a short while after Hueston's balk-line exhibition with Foy and played a 75-point game. Hueston ran 68 in the string.

It is his intention to practice balk-line every week expert will admit is going some for every fifty points, to say nothing of seventy-five. The inspectors who had seen the Jersey youth play both games marveled at his skill.

Hueston is not playing any pool at present, but has a challenge in for the winner of the match between Jerome Keogh and Clarence Safford. He thinks Keogh will win this match, and that will just suit him, as he lost the pool title to the Rochester expert and prefers to regain it from the same man.

DE ORO NEXT IN LINE Alfred De Oro, former pool and three-cushion champion, is next in line to play Hueston for the three-cushion title. De Oro and Hueston have a thorough dislike for each other, dating back to several years ago when they were competing together in pool tournaments. Hueston has beaten De Oro for the pool title, but the Cuban took the three-cushion championship last year.
