

OREGON GETS BIG BOOST IN SENATE

Senator Bourne Praises State's Election System, and Solons Fall Into Line

(Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, May 5.—Commending the election system of his state, Senator Bourne of Oregon in an extended speech in the senate today aroused a general debate on the question of representative government which dealt especially with the effect on the southern states of the system of selecting federal officials in that section.

Mr. Bourne dwelt in terms of admiration on the methods of conducting elections and selecting officeholders in Oregon. No sooner had he taken his seat than Senator Bacon of Georgia entered upon a plea for more voice in the appointment of federal officials for the southern states.

When Mr. Bourne concluded, Senator Brown of Nebraska asked general consent that 50,000 copies of the speech be printed for circulation, but Mr. Gallinger objected.

Mr. Brown spoke of the speech as a "remarkable one" and said it had demonstrated that the Oregon system was no longer an experiment. The Georgia senator's speech evoked extended remarks by Senator Carter of Montana, who advocated taking the postoffice out of politics.

HURRY BACK, PAULHAN! HERE'S A NEW WRINKLE

Exhaust and Suction System to Impart Great Speed to Aerial Craft

H. C. Berry, a mining man, long a resident of California, who, in his spare time, delights in pitting his ingenuity against difficult mechanical problems, has evolved a method of propulsion for aircraft which he believes is destined to revolutionize the theories by which it is now sought to improve navigation of the air, and will make airships of both the lighter and heavier than air types immediately practicable commercially.

Setting about to discover a substitute for the screw propeller, which, while the only successful means of propelling ships through the water, is far from efficient when applied to air craft, Mr. Berry began to experiment with the exhaust pressure and suction system, and was so impressed by the efficiency of a small working model which he constructed that he has applied for patents, which he expects to receive soon from Washington.

The great defect of the screw propeller, when applied to air craft, is the creation of a vacuum immediately in front of the propeller blades, which has a tendency to retard the advance of the ship. By the suction and exhaust system Mr. Berry states that the creation of a partial vacuum in front of the propeller, added to the pressure of the air being forced out at the rear, is capable of producing a high rate of speed. The model which he has constructed, and which is now in preparation in his shop on Olive street, consists of an ordinary twelve-inch blower, such as is used by blacksmiths or for ventilating, driven by a motor of one and one-half horsepower. The machinery is mounted on a pivoted frame work of ten feet radius, weighing about 500 pounds and offering considerable resistance to the air. Solely by the force of the suction and exhaust of the blower the framework is revolved twenty times a minute, developing a speed of fifteen miles an hour.

The inventor is preparing to build a dirigible with a capacity of three persons, which will cost about \$10,000, and which, he expects, from the speed developed by his crude model, will show much more speed than any of the dirigibles now built.

POISON TESTS FAULTY, SWEARS HYDE EXPERT

Vaughn's Analysis for Strychnine in Col. Swope's Liver Criticised

KANSAS CITY, May 5.—Testifying at the Hyde trial today, Dr. Walter M. Cross, city chemist of Kansas City, branded the analysis made by Dr. Victor C. Vaughn on the liver of Col. Swope as incomplete.

Ninety per cent of the substance that remained when Dr. Vaughn made his final estimate of the amount of poison in the organ might have been foreign, said Dr. Cross. The witness pointed out that as Col. Swope had used a tonic containing cincholine, this drug would remain after the process Dr. Vaughn used had been completed. Dr. Vaughn used but a small amount of the foreign matter was so small, however, that he could make a good estimate of the amount of poison present.

S. W. Spangler, for several years business agent for the millionaire, said Mr. Swope died heavily until eleven months before his death. The millionaire was a user of patent medicines and remedies containing strychnine, said Spangler.

While the defense interposed numerous objections, the state brought out that Col. Swope on the day before his death, told Spangler he would be in Kansas City within a few days to make a new will disposing of the residue of his estate.

Typhoid fever, uraemic poisoning, or meningitis, said Dr. F. W. Froelich, often caused convulsions similar to those produced in the cases of Thomas H. Chrisman and Margaret Swope.

'NOW WILL YOU BE GOOD, RAILROADS?' SAYS HOUSE

WASHINGTON, May 5.—Representative Knowland of California, offered an amendment to the railroad bill today providing that when a railroad, in competition with a water route, lowered a rate, it should not be permitted to increase the rate until, in a hearing before the interstate commerce commission, it had shown a reason for the increase aside from the question of the water route. Democrats, insurgents and some regular Republicans, even members of the committee reporting the bill, supported Mr. Knowland's amendment, which, it was said, would prevent a railroad from eliminating water route competition by a low rate and then increase the rate as soon as the competition was removed. By 106 to 77 the amendment was adopted.

'WHY CLUB' CAN'T SEE WHY COUNTY SHOULD DIVIDE

At a meeting of the "Why club" at the Young Men's Christian Association last evening the subject discussed was: "Resolved, That the city and county governments of Los Angeles be merged into one."

According to the general opinion of the members of the "Why club" it would be absurdity itself for such a consolidation to become effective, because of the widely spread territory comprising the county of Los Angeles.

A debate on the subject of county division followed. The affirmative was taken by Messrs. Bell and Barker, while the negative, which was accorded the victory, was supported very ably by Messrs. King and Arnold. R. W. Law acted as critic.
