

BALLINGER MUST HAVE DONE WRONG BRANDEIS ARGUES

Drags Admission of Former Rebuff in Land Office Incident from Secretary

WILL ASK NO DATA OF TAFT

Woman at Hearing Creates Stir by Shouting Condemnation of Committee

WASHINGTON, May 10.—The existence of rulings in the interior department which Mr. Ballinger must have violated in appearing before the general land office in behalf of the Cunningham coal claimants, after his retirement as land commissioner, was brought out by Attorney Brandeis in cross examination of the secretary of the interior in the Ballinger-Pinchot investigation today.

Mr. Brandeis secured an admission from Mr. Ballinger that he had been barred from appearing before the land office by a similar ruling in another case subsequent to his activity in the Cunningham case, and that he had become secretary of the interior.

IGNORED RULINGS

Mr. Ballinger said he had not called these rulings to the attention of the president to assist him in reaching a conclusion in the Glavis charge because he did not think there was any law to sustain them.

The committee decided to grant the request that Oscar Lawler, assistant attorney general for the interior department, be asked to furnish the original or copies of the memorandum prepared for the president last September, and which Mr. Brandeis had intimated the president followed in writing his letter vindicating Ballinger and dismissing Glavis. By unanimous vote the committee refused to ask the president for similar information.

During an exchange of amenities between Chairman Nelson and Attorney Brandeis in the course of a wearisome afternoon, one of the latter's remarks rebuked the former because he had undertaken to discipline the inquisitor for "snapping" at members of the committee.

WOMAN BUTTS IN

"You can't insult witnesses, but you can't insult the committee," said Mr. Nelson hotly, addressing Mr. Brandeis. "You can't insult him either," interrupted the lawyer's fair feminine defender, whose identity was hidden behind a solid row of chantecler hats. Senator Nelson was too surprised to answer. So was Mr. Brandeis, and harmony was restored.

Attorney Brandeis had almost concluded the cross-examination of Mr. Ballinger when the hearing was adjourned until Tuesday. He devoted practically the entire day to the subject of the "clear listing" of the Cunningham claims by Commissioner Ballinger, to show extraordinary haste had been made to issue the claim to patent, and that Glavis' reiterated protests alone had caused Mr. Ballinger to pause.

'SH' ALL RI; BE DRUNK, BUT PLAY SHOFT PEDAL

Chicago Judge Says It's Folly to Arrest Quiet Inebriates

CHICAGO, May 10.—Declaring that the practice of arresting "quiet drunks" was illegal and unfair, Municipal Judge Clelland yesterday appeared before the judiciary council of the city council and urged the passage of his recently written ordinance on the question. He raised these points: "It is not a violation of the ordinance to get drunk quietly. "Much time is frittered away on these arrests, while law-breakers go uncaught. "The liberty and reputation of a respectable, but weak, citizen ought to be of sufficient value to warrant some tracing in protecting him. "His remedies for handling of 'drunks,' are: "To escort them home or to a police station without booking them. "To arrest no 'drunks' unless they are disorderly and refuse to be quieted. "Drunkness is not and never has been of itself a violation of the city ordinance," declared the jurist. "It is only when an intoxicated person is disorderly that he is subject to arrest. "What's the use of ruining a reputable citizen's reputation because he is a bit weak and foolish?"

GOVERNMENT 'CANDY KIDS' ARE SUSPENDED FROM DUTY

Customs Inspectors at New York Again in Trouble

NEW YORK, May 10.—That Collector Loeb's vigilant watch over the customs service here has not relaxed is evident today when the announcement came of twelve additional suspensions as a result of fresh investigations.

Nine of the suspended men are inspectors. All were formerly engaged in weighing importations of sugar, figs and cheese.

These suspensions, it is announced, are the first result of a general investigation being made by Winfred T. Dennison, assistant United States attorney general, and his force of secret service men from the department of justice.

The blow fell without the least warning. There was much excitement among the men employed in that department of the service when the suspensions were announced. Some of the men affected were supposed to have good records, and it was given out that further inquiry might result in reinstatements.

Every branch of government employment in the port is under investigation and other suspensions are expected.

BRAKEMAN SHOTS HUSBAND AFTER COURTING HIS WIFE

Man Probably Will Die as Result of Injuries

ROSEVILLE, Cal., May 10.—J. M. Chateau, a plumber in the employ of the Southern Pacific company here, was shot and fatally wounded this morning by Mike Leahay, a brakeman, formerly employed by the same road. The shooting was the result of the infatuation of Leahay for Chateau's wife and was the sequel to the swearing out of a warrant by Chateau yesterday asking the arrest of Leahay who, he claimed, tried to persuade his wife to elope.

When Chateau went to his wood house this morning Leahay sprang out, revolver in hand, and before Chateau could protect himself, Leahay fired. Chateau fell to the ground and Leahay seized an ax and attempted to decapitate the prostrate man. He was prevented by a neighbor who saw the trouble and ran over to the scene.

Leahay is in jail at Auburn, but no formal charge has been made against him. Chateau is in a hospital at Sacramento. It is believed he cannot recover.

BLOOD-STAINED AUTO GIVES POLICE A CLEW

CHICAGO, May 10.—An automobile with blood stains on the wheels, found abandoned in an alley here today, is believed to be the machine which caused the death of Mrs. Albert Behr last night.

Mrs. Behr and her husband were about to cross the street when the car swerved into Mrs. Behr, who was almost decapitated before the eyes of her husband. The chauffeur quickly disappeared into Lincoln park.

The alley in which the machine was found by detectives is several miles from the scene of the accident. A policeman, whose son is believed to have been one of the five men in the car, is active in conducting the investigation.

WHISKERS GROW IN GRAFTON JAIL; NO BARBERS ALLOWED

GRAFTON, Ill., May 10.—John J. Keon, a Socialist in jail here for refusing to pay his poll tax, will not be allowed to shave during his six months' imprisonment.

After being in jail a month Keon asked permission to be shaved. This was emphatically refused by the mayor, who has jurisdiction over the prisoner. A local barber, anxious to make a fee, begged the mayor to let him shave, but he would not. The latter says Keon cannot have a shave if his whiskers attain Rip Van Winkle length during his confinement. They are now an inch long.

TAKES AWAY DEAD MAN'S MONEY AND DOCUMENTS

BAKERSFIELD, May 10.—C. H. Norton of Elko, Idaho, and Randburg, this county, who came here to close an important mining deal, died Friday at the Bakersfield sanitarium, and unless some one claims the body he will be buried in the potter's field. A man called at the sanitarium, took away all Norton's money and papers, and saying he would arrange for the funeral, disappeared. Norton's wife is supposed to be in Boise.

ACCIDENTAL SHOT IS FATAL

SAN FRANCISCO, May 10.—Maurice Weinstein, a youth who was accidentally shot last night by Edwin McCord, 15 years old, died today as a result of the wound. According to witnesses, young McCord was examining a 22-caliber rifle, when it was accidentally discharged, striking Weinstein, who was across the street. McCord is under arrest.

COMB CRINA DOWN FOR WHITE SLAVE

Missing Abbie Sheehan Thought to Hold Key to Chamber of Infamy

PROBE TERRIBLE TRAFFIC

Mills Sing, Freed on Charge of Selling Edith Curtis, Is Rearrested

Within five minutes after his dismissal by Judge Summerfield on a charge of selling 16-year-old Edith Curtis into a life of shame among the Chinese, Mills Sing, alleged white slave agent of the Los Angeles Chinatown, was rearrested on a similar charge and remanded to the custody of the sheriff in bonds to the sum of \$5000. Preliminary hearing in the case was set for Monday when the prosecution, conducted by Deputy District Attorney North, will have made strenuous efforts to find the missing 15-year-old Abbie Sheehan, whom the authorities believe the Chinese have spirited away. The prosecution claims that with the aid of the Sheehan girl they will be able to prove conclusively that Sing is sending white girls of tender years down the mysterious road of the white slave traffic.

The authorities believe that a branch of an eastern Chinese white slave organization is operating indirectly through the Chinese and Japanese missions in this city. Evidence from witnesses in Sing's preliminary hearing has cast strong sidelights on the operations of the wily orientals, posing in the guise of interested students of Christianity.

LIED TO DEGRADATION

"It is through the tenderness and 'students' professing to be studying Christianity," said a prominent official yesterday, "that these cunning fellows obtain a grip on their prey. Once in the power of an organization of white slave dealers the white girl, whoever she may be, has little chance to escape. They are bartered and sold like so many cattle and in order to obtain a stronger hold upon them, even though it shortens their life, the vices of the orient, from opium smoking down, are forced upon them, until even their strongest mind has succumbed to the evil influences and the girls become degraded and degenerate and no longer desire to return to their former lives."

It is claimed that the Sing case, providing the prosecution is successful in locating witnesses who have completely disappeared, will open the eyes of the police to a condition of affairs in parts of Chinatown that would put San Francisco's notorious "half acre of hell" to shame.

Sing, from an unknown source, has obtained money to employ a strong array of legal talent who are not letting an opportunity slip to gain his liberty.

LITTLE 'UNS MAKE BEST DETECTIVES, SAYS MAYOR

Prefers Hunchback to a Giant Any Old Day

NEW YORK, May 10.—Mayor Gaynor wants a few little men on the detective force, even "hunchbacks and singed cats and little fellows who can go through keyholes and knotholes." He adds that if he have eyes in the back of his head, so much the better. But the only kind of giants needed as detectives are mental giants, he says.

The mayor's views were made known in a letter to the chairman of the civil service board after Joseph Hocker, six feet, five inches tall, had called on the mayor, saying that he had passed the examination for a policeman, but was afraid of being disqualified. He departed with the mayor's letter in his pocket.

"He is too big for the detective force," wrote his honor. "He could not go anywhere without being seen." Hocker hopes to get a job as an ordinary policeman.

FATE OF GOHL, ALLEGED SLAYER, GOING TO JURY

MONTESANO, Wash., May 10.—With the instructions of Judge Ben Sheeks already before the jury and with the opening argument for the state made by E. E. Boner completed, indications at noon were that the case of William Gohl, former Sailors Union agent at Aberdeen, on trial for the alleged murder of Charles Hadberg, a sailor, will go to the jury tomorrow morning.

Judge Sheeks' instructions were brief, only twelve minutes being required for their reading.

MARKSMANSHIP? WELL, THEY HIT A STEAMER!

PORT TOWNSEND, Wash., May 10.—During target practice today an 18-pound projectile fired from a motor battery at Fort Case struck the steamer Evans Thomas, which was towing a target, and going through the steamer's deck, penetrated the steam drum and dented the boiler. Several men on the Thomas narrowly escaped death. The steamer was towed to a dock for repairs.

COURT TELLS MILLING COMPANY TO FORGET IT

DES MOINES, Ia., May 10.—Judge Smith McPherson, in the federal court today, dismissed the complaint of the Shawnee Milling company of Kansas and Updike Milling company of Omaha, brought in behalf of the Western Milling company, asking that U. S. District Attorney M. L. Temple of Iowa be enjoined from seizing bleached flour shipped into Iowa. The court upholds the federal ruling as regards bleached flour.

HORSE KICKS MAN TO DEATH

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
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
