

YALE GRADS ARE HOSTS TO PREXY

Spirit of Old Eli Stronger Today Than It Ever Was, Says Dr. Hadley
THE GRADUATE BODY IS LOYAL
Increased Wealth Does Not Shatter Ideals, Declares Head of University

That the Yale of today, in spirit and especially with regard to unity of its several departments, is superior to the Yale of old, was the tenor of the address of President Arthur T. Hadley of Yale, at the twelfth annual banquet of the Southern California Yale club at the Alexandria hotel last evening. To the alumni, who have pleaded with the professors to subordinate the interests of their departments to the general interest of the one great university, President Hadley attributes a large share of credit for this advance.

The banquet, at which President Hadley was the guest of honor and the principal speaker, was attended by about fifty Yale alumni from many parts of Southern California. Dr. A. S. Phelps, '83, presided and presented President Hadley, Dr. E. C. Moore, superintendent of the Los Angeles schools, who is within a short time to take the chair of education at Yale, spoke briefly on the pleasure of anticipation of his new work and regret at breaking ties which bind him to this city and state.

Blue Yale flags and blue Yale streamers, artistically draped, adorned the banquet room. Through the center of the table its entire length was a bank of beautiful flowers, hidden among which were a number of blue electric lights. In the very center of the table was a pretty little fountain which played throughout the evening.

FOUR MORE INDICTED ON BUCKET SHOP CHARGES

Department of Justice Opens New Line of Prosecution on Alleged Gamblers

WASHINGTON, May 23.—The department of justice took a new tack today in the crusade against bucket shops. In addition to the conspiracy charge made against nine men in the cities of New York, Jersey City, Baltimore and Washington last April, the department today lodged a complaint of a direct violation of section 85 of the district code, which forbids bucketing or setting up a gaming table in the district.


This direct charge of operating a bucket shop in the district is made against the persons who are said to constitute the Standard Stock and Exchange company of Jersey City.

Four additional persons, who were not mentioned in previous indictments are now named. These are Samuel W. Adler and C. A. Tillis, known among his associates as "Cat" Tillis of New York, and William Fox and E. M. Browning of Baltimore.

Two indictments were returned today, charging conspiracy and the setting of a gaming table against these four men, in addition to nine eastern men.

All are charged not only with entering into a conspiracy to violate the district law against bucket shops, but also with being actually engaged in the conduct of the brokerage business run here in the name of Duryee & Co.

12-YEAR-OLD BOY ADMITS KILLING COMPANION AGED 8

TOPEKA, Kan., May 23.—Peter Kopar, aged 12, the son of a farmer living twelve miles northwest of Topeka, was arrested today for the murder of Arthur James, aged 8, the son of a neighbor. The boys had quarreled Sunday over a hat and the Kopar boy went home and secured a rifle and returned and shot the James boy. Kopar was traced by his tracks in the mud to his home and there arrested. He made a full confession.

PROTESTS LEE STATUE

FREESPORT, Ill., May 23.—Investigating against the placing of the statue of Gen. Robert E. Lee in the hall of fame in Washington, Col. James P. Darling, past commander of Columbia post G. A. R., Chicago, tonight addressed the initial campaign of the forty-fourth state encampment of the Illinois Grand Army of the Republic.

WASHINGTON, May 23.—Eighteen passengers were injured in the wreck late today of a special train running on the second section of No. 10 on the Southern railway, near Cedar Run bridge, Virginia. The engineer and four passengers were seriously shaken up and cut. Mrs. S. H. Pennington of Seattle was among the injured.

SEYLER ON TRIAL FOR GIRL'S DEATH

Evidence Introduced Connecting Him with the Atlantic City Tragedy Last February
PRISONER'S ALIBI DISPUTED
His Own Brother Is Expected to Go on the Stand as Witness for the Prosecution

[Associated Press] MAYS LANDING, N. J., May 23.—Rapid progress was made today in the trial of William Seyler, the young man accused of having murdered Jane Adams on the million dollar pier in Atlantic City last February. A jury was chosen in an hour and twenty minutes. Later the prisoner was arraigned at the opening of court. Prosecutor Goldenburg in his opening address, said: "Jane Adams met her death defending her honor." The first witnesses called were the motorman and the policeman who found the girl's bruised body with torn clothing frozen to it, lying on the beach where it had been cast by the waves several days after she disappeared.

WOMAN SUFFOCATES; FIRE IMPERILS MANY OTHERS

Sensational Rescues by Workers in New York Conflagration

NEW YORK, May 23.—There were sensational rescues by women today in a blazing conflagration on East Seventeenth street. Mrs. Mary Miller died in a fireman's arms from the effect of smoke after she had been dragged to the roof, while her husband, William Miller, clutching the 11-month-old son of the couple, was rescued just in time by another fireman.

150 ARE GRADUATED FROM LELAND STANFORD

Colorado College President Delivers Commencement Address

STANFORD UNIVERSITY, May 23.—Commencement exercises were held today in the assembly hall of Stanford university, where nearly 150 graduates receiving their diplomas. Professor W. E. Howard presided and introduced President Slocum of Colorado college, who delivered the commencement address.

FAITHFUL OLD BEAST RETIRED ON A PENSION

CHICAGO, May 23.—Porter, a 26-year-old-horse, was given the highest recognition ever awarded any animal in Lincoln park, when the commission yesterday formally adopted resolutions commending him on his sixteen years of faithful service and retiring him pensioned for life, to spend the remainder of his days in luxury.


SACRAMENTO BANDITS ARE GIVEN LONG SENTENCES


