


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Eight "Clubs!"

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**TENDERFOOT FUNNY
IN WILD WEST TOGS**

**A. J. Stewart, Fresh from Boston,
Upsets the Sunday Quiet
of Eastlake Park**

Within forty-eight hours after his purchase of a cowboy outfit, the regulation uniform of a "wild west" riding club of which he is a member, A. J. Stewart, a seven-day arrival from Boston, living at 463 East Avenue Twenty-eight, was arrested yesterday on a charge of disturbing the peace of Eastlake park, while riding an unruly horse.

Stewart, who wears a monocle under his sombrero, has lived all his life in an eastern city and has had little opportunity to develop equestrian abilities. He rides with a quick, hard bounce that responds unflinchingly to the stride of his mount.

Yesterday, accompanied by members of his club and attired in Arizona array, he cantered through Eastlake park with a strange, gaunt animal

beneath him, fresh from a long rest in the livery stable. The mare exhibited alarming symptoms when she neared automobiles and even shied at children until Stewart, according to the police, lost his temper and applied his new spurs. Then trouble began. Stewart's speed did the cake walk and wound up with a Salome dance on the flower gardens while pedestrians, out for a quiet Sunday afternoon, scattered for safety.

Stewart's anger vanished as if by magic, and he tried other measures. Hastily unbuckling his spurs he dropped them to the ground and stroked the best gently on the neck. The mare, instead of responding to these friendly overtures reared on her hind feet and repeated the cake walk. Stewart lost his hat and lariat, but he clung desperately for safety to the pommel of his saddle and managed to stick on.

Members of the police traffic squad finally came to his rescue and led his unruly horse into the open driveway. Then they insisted that Stewart dismount and lead the horse to the livery, which the easterner indignantly refused to do. He was a free man, he told the policemen, the park was free, and he was going to complete his ride.

Stewart, chaps, spurs, sombrero, and horse were consequently taken to police headquarters, where he was booked on a charge of disturbing the peace. The case will be heard in police court today.
