

CONLEY EASY WIPER FOR MORAN Bantam Champion Hard as Steel and Most Confident of a Decisive Victory

WEIGHTS DO NOT BOTHER HIM Both Arrange Big Shows as a Windup of a Hard Training Period at Camps Today

Unquestionably, the classiest scrap that has been staged here in several months will be the ten-round newspaper decision affair between Owen Moran, the clever and speedy English lightweight, and Frankie Conley, the tough little bantam champion, which McCarey will put on the boards Tuesday night at Naud Junction, Calif. Real class on both sides will be involved and although the bantam champ is taking a big weight handicap upon himself, the scrap should be a blazer at every jump from start to finish. Conley has lost only one fight in his career, Ad Wolgast getting the decision in their first fight at eight rounds, but afterward fought Wolgast to two draws at the same distance and has been whipping featherweights of good class right along. He is clever, moxie and aggressive brawler and carries a knock-out punch in either swat stick. He is game to the core and will swap wallops with any one of the top-notch fighters in the world and predicts that he will whip the Britisher so decisively that there will be no question regarding their individual supremacy.

Both boys will wind up the period of hard training today with extra cards for the entertainment of the fans who visit their camps. Moran has engaged Montana Kid and Kid Dalton to box with him this afternoon at his Venice training quarters, while Conley will have Kid Cleveland, Maxie Brown and one or two other top-notch fighters. Both will begin the afternoon workout at 3 o'clock.

Leads Stanford Athletes, by Comfortable Margin—Californians Tie for Third

FIVE RECORDS SHATTERED

Davenport of Chicago Proves to be Star of the Day, Lowering Two Good Marks

URBANA, Ill., June 4.—Notre Dame won the Intercollegiate Conference Athletic association annual track and field meet with 23 points today, after one of the greatest contests in the history of the event. Leland Stanford was second with 17 points, while Chicago nosed out Illinois and California for third with 13 points. Illinois was tied for fourth with California with 12 points.

It was the first time that the championship has ever been won by a non-Californian. The winners had a well balanced team and won easily. Five new conference records were established. Davenport was the star in the smashing, with marks of 48.45 in the quarter mile and 1:59.35 in the half mile.

Baker of Oberlin equaled the record of 9 minutes 50 seconds in the two miles. Philbrook of Notre Dame won the medal for the highest individual score with 11 points. He won the shotput and discus throw and was third in the high jump. Davenport of Chicago, Nelson of Washington State and Baker of Oberlin scored ten points each.

The one mile resulted in a heart-breaking fight between Baker of Oberlin and Dohmen of Wisconsin, the former winning by six inches. The remarkable time of 4:29.45 broke the record of 4:25 made by James D. Laidley of Chicago in 1905.

The 440-yard run was easy for Davenport of Chicago, who won by several yards in the record time of 48.45 seconds, breaking the mark of 49.35 seconds made by Merrill of Beloit in 1901. Wayman of Leland Stanford jumped into the lead at the start and ran a phenomenal 220 yards. He had a fair chance to lead the whole race, but Davenport passed him on the turn and won with yards to spare. Stolz of Stanford was third.

Davenport smashed another record in the half mile, when he won easily in 1:59.35, breaking the old record of 1:57.25, made by Lightbody in 1905. He ran a waltzing race and was tenth on the back stretch. Steadily he pushed on, passing man after man and broke the tape three yards in front of Jardine of Colorado college, who was second. Hull of Minnesota was third.

Wayman of Washington State won the final heat of the 100-yard dash in 10.15, after a hard battle with Washington of Notre Dame second and McCoy of Miami third. The time was slower than any of the three preliminaries, all run in 10 flat, the best time in the history of the conference. The three winners, Straube, Wasson and Nelson, were not included in the final 100.

California jumped into the lead by scoring six points in 120-yard hurdles. Edwards won handily in 15.45, with Grayson of Purdue second and another Californian, Donald, third. California's lead was short lived, as Notre Dame landed first in the discus and ran its total up to nine points. Philbrook won with a throw of 24 feet 6 1/2 inches. Alderman of Iowa was second and Portman, the Western reserve giant, third.

Notre Dame added five more points to its score when Philbrook annexed the shot put with 42.6 feet.

Minnesota scored when Frank took second, and Spring of Illinois was third. The conference pole vault record had a narrow escape when Murphy of Illinois won with 12 feet 4 1/4 inches, five-eighths of an inch below the 12 feet 4 7/8 inches held by James of Indiana in 1906.
