### SURRENDERS FEARING TO DISGRACE FUTURE WIFE

Allen N. Smith Confesses He Escaped from Reformatory at St. Cloud, Minn.

PASADENA, June 5.—That he surrendered to the police in order to serve an unexpired sentence and clear his name for fear he would marry the woman he loves and disgrace her afterward when discovered as a fugitive from justice, is the confession of Allen N. Smith, made to Chief of Police Wood yesterday. Smith gave himself up to the local authorities on March 24, stating that he had escaped from the St. Cloud reformatory in Minnesota after serving a few months of a seven year sentence for grand larceny, and that since his escape he has been continually haunted with the thought of being a fugitive.

He had been working in Pasadena recently as a chimney sweep and previous to coming here he was employed on a ranch near Redlands, where he met the woman for love of whom he started life anew. The object of his attentions is said to be standing by him in his trouble and showing a willingness to do all in her power to assist him in his desire to lead a better life. She has been in daily communication with him and has paid several visits to his cell.

Officers from St. Paul arrived in Pasadena yesterday to take Smith back to the St. Cloud reformatory to complete his term. They will leave with their prisoner Monday morning.

### OPENS MOUTH TO YAWN; JAWS BECOME LOCKED; MINING MAN SUFFERS

SAN BERNARDINO, June 4.—With his jaws locked wide open, Paul Hammerstadt of Silver Lake, was today brought in from the desert and taken to Los Angeles for medical treatment.

Hammerstadt was in the midst of a self satisfying yawn when he discovered that he could not close his mouth, his jaws being widely parted. All efforts so far made to relieve the mining promoter and readjust his jaws have failed, and it is feared that an operation may be necessary to allow Hammerstadt to enjoy bringing his jaws to their normal position.

### CAN'T GET EMPLOYMENT, SO HE GIVES UP LIFE

Wife Finds Husband Dead, with Poison Bottle Near

Suffering from nervous prostration, with which he had long been afflicted, and dependent over his inability to secure employment, Hugh R. Hawkins, 40 years old, committed suicide last evening by taking cyanide of potassium. His body was found by his wife, who returned to their home at 1175 West Eighth street about 8 o'clock after being absent for the afternoon. She found the body lying on the floor of the bedroom with an empty bottle beside it.

A physician was quickly summoned, who upon his arrival at the house found he could do nothing. The body was removed to the undertaking parlors of Bresser Brothers, where an inquest probably will be held this morning.

Hawkins was an expert accountant and during the last few years had been employed by several of the large business houses of this city.

### PRISONERS MAKE ANOTHER TAKE SATURDAY PLUNGE

### Efforts to Avoid Cleanliness at County Jail Fail

Cleanliness is demanded in the county jail. Each prisoner is compelled to take a bath before being assigned to a cell, and thereafter, during his term of incarceration, must bathe every Saturday. Yesterday morning, when the second relay of prisoners was released from the tank wherein are kept the short term men, Ernest Temester, a prisoner brought in from Monrovia, where he was sentenced to serve ten days, refused to get in the plunge. He contended that a bath was not essential to his mode of living. He did not resent disrobing, for Deputy Sheriff Kissler had given him a suit of jail clothes which were far superior to the suit he had on.

When he was told to enter the shower, Temester acted as if he was about to be executed and flatly refused to obey.

Jailor Gallagher put in an appearance and after seeing that the man would not voluntarily obey the prison rules, he ordered three prisoners to put the water-fearing Temester under the shower. Temester backed up to the rear of the room and attempted to ward off the men, but his efforts were futile, for the three husky prisoners pounced upon him and in less time than it takes to tell about it, had turned on a good stream of cold water and held him under it.

Upon his promise to use soap, Temester was allowed to use warm water. He cursed every man who had a hand in forcing him to bathe and upon returning to his cell, was ostracized by the other prisoners.

### 3000 PERSONS EXPECTED AT STATE SOCIETIES' BANQUET

Committee Reports 500 Native Sons and Daughters to Attend

It is expected that more than 3000 people will be in attendance at the banquet to be held the evening of June 17, under the auspices of the Federation of State Societies. The executive committee, having the banquet in charge, held a meeting last evening in the office of Colonel F. True. Reports from various members showed that 258 plates have been reserved. The Native Daughters and Native Sons will act as hosts and hostesses at the banquet and have reserved 500 plates for members of their respective parls. The executive committee will meet again Thursday evening at 7:30 o'clock in the chamber of commerce headquarters. By that time the committee hopes to have all the plates taken.

### RECONNAISSANCE IS MADE OVER LONDON IN AIRSHIP

Machine Flies from Aldershot and Circles Over St. Paul's

LONDON, June 4.—An army airship made a surprise reconnaissance over London during the night.

Leaving Aldershot at 11:30 o'clock last evening the craft started for London in the teeth of a stiff breeze. It reached St. Paul's two hours later and circled over the cathedral at a height of 100 feet. Returning, the airship arrived at the barracks at Aldershot at 5 o'clock this morning. The distance between Aldershot and London is about thirty-five miles and the time made by the airship first against the wind and then racing with it, is considered excellent.

### FALSELY ARRESTED, SAYS MAN; SUES FOR \$100,000

### Begins Action Against Quartet. Charged with Forgery

Alleging false arrest, Louis Schneltderman, a Fullerton tailor, yesterday filed a \$100,000 suit against E. R. Mills and R. Stone, who arrested him on complaint of the American Bankers' association, and W. J. Burns and W. P. Sheridan, detectives for the American Bankers' association.

He specifically alleges that he was falsely arrested on a charge of forgery by mistake and taken to San Antonio, Texas, where he was released when it was found he was the wrong man. The complaint is virtually an attack on Burns, who recently figured as one of the San Francisco graft prosecutors. Burns is accused of causing the plaintiff's arrest through his influence as the head of the detective agency. Several paragraphs of the complaint are devoted to Burns and his work.

Schneltderman's attorney is Earl Rogers, who defended Patrick Calhoun in San Francisco when he was prosecuted by Francis J. Heney.

### OFFICIAL DOG POPULATION OF LOS ANGELES IS 9935

The canine population of Los Angeles, according to figures on file in the office of the city clerk, is 9935. This, however, represents only the licensed dogs, no enumeration of the "vags" being obtainable.

The dog year begins July 1, when a new license fee is due. The present year will be thirteen months long, a change in the law having been responsible for that curious freak of the canine calendar. Heretofore June 1 has marked the beginning of the new license year for Pido and Rover.

### WIDOWS OF WORKMEN ASK CITY FOR FINANCIAL AID

Mayor Alexander has addressed a communication to the city council in which he again calls the attention of that body to a request for financial aid, presented in behalf of Mrs. George Merrill and Mrs. Joe Lugo, whose husbands were killed by caving earth, while working for the city. The mayor says that Mrs. Merrill, so far as he can learn, has no means. Mrs. Lugo, however, is more fortunate, for the mayor has discovered that she owns her home, in addition to two houses which she rents and a small ranch.

### DEMAND GATES AT CROSSING

The board of public utilities yesterday addressed a communication to the city council asking that body to compel the Southern Pacific railroad to establish gates at the intersection of Sixth and Alameda streets. The board asked that such gates be placed some time ago, but received no definite promise from the railroad officials. The crossing is said to be dangerous, especially since the opening of the new city market with its attendant increase in street traffic.

### OFFICES ROBBED

The offices of the Stout-Clairement company, 215 Stimson building, were entered early yesterday morning by a thief and a small amount of cash and a number of stamps taken from a desk. The thief entered through a window from a light well. He opened the desk with a "jimmy." Mr. Clairement stated that other offices of the building were entered but that nothing was taken from them.

### MOTHER-IN-LAW TO BLAME, SAYS MAN

### Showman Franks Gets a Divorce from 'Snowie May Belle'; Desertion Grounds

Alexander Franks, who told Judge James that he was a "professional man," secured a decree of divorce from Mable P. Franks, known in vaudeville circles as "Snowie May Belle," in the superior court yesterday morning on the ground of desertion.

He declared she repeatedly told him "he was not the man for her," and although they agreed to live together again she frequently refused to remain with him. Her mother was the main cause of the trouble, he said. He did not want her mother to live with him. He offered her a comfortable home on condition that mother-in-law did not enter the nest, he declared, but she refused to leave her parent.

Laura Gowen, another member of the "profession," testified in favor of the plaintiff. She declared that Mrs. Franks was always "butting" in when Franks was directing rehearsals of plays he had written. When the husband told the chorus to act in one manner, the wife always endeavored to show how the manner could be improved, she declared.

"They made a nice little couple in vaudeville," she said, "and I tried to bring them together, but Mrs. Franks got sore on me for helping him. She said it was none of my business."

An attorney for I. Ransom, who is suing for a divorce from Stella Ransom, informed Judge James that the plaintiff had a position awaiting him in Denver and asked for an earlier trial of the suit than on September 16, the date set. The action was placed on the calendar for next Monday, when it will be heard by Judge James.
