Brother of Missing Youth Returns After Futile Search

SEATTLE, June 28.—Lieut. John Rodgers, U. S. N., son of Rear Admiral John A. Rodgers, commandant of the Puget Sound navy yard, returned from

a two months' stay in Alaska yesterday, where he conducted a search for his 21-year-old brother, Alexander C. Rodgers, who was last heard from July 10, 1909. Lieut. Rodgers was unable to find any trace of the missing youth. Alexander Rodgers went up to Alaska last summer and when last heard from had started for Fairbanks over the Valdez-Fairbanks trail. It is believed that he wandered off the trail, became lost and perished.

READING, Pa., June 28.—The first fatality caused by firecrackers here was recorded yesterday when Mamie, the 7-year-old daughter of William Fox, was burned to death.

The child was playing with the ordinary shooting cracker when sparks ignited her dress and in a few minutes she was ablaze from head to foot. She died several hours later in a hospital.

NOTED FINANCIER LAUDS POLICIES OF PRES. TAFT

Jacob Schiff Declares Postal Savings Bank Will Injure the Small Institutions

SEATTLE, June 28.—Jacob H. Schiff of New York and a party of guests who are to accompany him on a tour of Alaska arrived in Seattle today and will leave for the north on the steamship Ramona Thursday. "The policies of President Taft are entirely proper and his legislation legislation enacted by the congress which has just adjourned will be beneficial," said Mr. Schiff in an interview. "Railroad regulation is all right and the regulation of the railroads has, in the present bill, gone to a greater degree than any previous measure. It was the uncertainty of things that was working havoc with the business world. The railroad bill is now passed and the railroads know what to expect. They can quickly adjust themselves to the new situation and within a very few months the affairs of the business and financial world should be on a satisfactory basis. "The people who get 3 1/2 and 4 per cent interest on their savings accounts in the larger cities will not deposit their money in the postoffices," said he, turning to the postal savings bank bill. "I can see how those in the smaller communities will find it difficult to get securities to deposit with the government for the money the postal savings bank accounts will furnish them. Therefore, the government will be forced to take the money deposited in the postoffices and deposit it in Washington or elsewhere. This will work a hardship on the small banks in the less populated portions of the country."

BOY DROWNS IN BAY SANTA CRUZ, June 28.—Sefno Steano, the 10-year-old son of a fisherman, is believed to have been drowned last evening while fishing at the end of the wharf. His cap was washed up on the beach today, and the bay is being searched for his body.

BANKER, RELEASED FROM PRISON, IS REARRESTED

ROCK FORD, Colo., June 28.—Immediately on his release today on parole from the Colorado penitentiary, John R. Godding, the former banker, was rearrested, charged with accepting deposits after he knew his bank was insolvent. Godding was taken to La Junta this afternoon, arraigned before Judge J. L. Rizer, and his bond fixed at \$9000. After procuring satisfactory bondsmen, Godding left for his home here.

PATERSON, N. J., June 28.—Fire early today swept a block on Main street from Ward to Market streets in this city and caused a loss estimated at \$500,000. Five firemen were injured by a falling wall, and others had narrow escapes. The burned buildings include the Van Dyke Furniture company's store, where the fire started; the Lockwood Brothers furniture store building, the Donohue building, Daly's moving picture house and a number of smaller structures.
