The Quest for Beauty

CARE OF THE FACE

There is no time of the year when the face needs as much attention as in the winter weather. The dust, dirt, winds, sun and different degrees of temperature are all hard on the complexion and bring with them blackheads, pimples, freckles, sunburn and tan. These can all be avoided by using a massage cream. I do not advise the regular cold cream, as it is greasy and in many cases causes hair to grow on the face. Use a grassless disappearing cream which you can easily make in your own home. Get a package of cerol from your druggist—when you get home heat a pint of water to the boiling point, set this in a pan of hot water on a slow fire, then stir in the cerol. When the cerol is all dissolved remove from the fire and stir constantly until cold. The only care necessary is to be sure that the cerol is all dissolved and stir constantly until cold. After washing the face, neck and arms thoroughly apply this cream plentifully, massaging until skin has absorbed all the cream. This formula makes a full pint of cream, about four times as much as you get of the ready made kinds.

FOR FALLING HAIR

Mix half a pint of alcohol with half a pint of water. Let stand a few minutes and add one ounce of beta-carotene. Rub well into the roots of the hair once a day for a few weeks; this not only stops the hair from falling out, but makes it strong and healthy and promotes its growth.

FOR TIRED, ACHING FEET

There is nothing quite so uncomfortable as aching feet. If you will use a couple of tablespoonsful of borax lather in the warm foot bath every night you will soon forget you had tired feet. To make the borax lather you simply dissolve two ounces of borax lather powder in one and one-half pints of boiling water and when cold add half a pint of alcohol.

TO REMOVE BLOTCHES

The best way to remove these is to take a glass of blood medicine and drink them out of the blood. Make a pint of heavy sugar syrup, then add one ounce of sarsene and take two teaspoonfuls

three or four times a day. You'll be surprised how quickly you'll get rid of those objectionable looking things.

TO REMOVE SUPERFLUOUS HAIR

Mix a little delol with enough warm water to make a soft paste; smear over the hair and leave on for a few minutes; then scrape off with a blunt knife; wash with warm water. Apply a little cerol cream or amoral lotion. Be sure and get delol in the original one ounce package.

FACE LOTION

Powders clog up the pores of the skin and cause blackheads. I always recommend a lotion made as follows: Dissolve contents of a two ounce package of amoral in a pint of hot water. When cold it is ready for use. Use after washing and drying the face and hands. You will not need to use powder with this lotion, as it gives the complexion that soft, delicate tint so much admired.

A SIMPLE ECZEMA REMEDY

This troublesome disease can be relieved instantly and cured in time by the following simple remedy: Dissolve two ounces of borolith in a pint of warm water, sop the affected parts with a piece of cotton saturated with this solution.

DEVELOPING THE BUST

Make a pint of granulated sugar syrup, say half a pound of sugar to pint of water; add the gallol and take two teaspoonfuls four times a day. Massaging with cocoa butter or cerol cream will help. The true gallol is quite expensive, but it is the only preparation I know of that will really do the work.
