

BAN ON BENZOATE OF SODAS LIFTED

Homeopaths in Convention at Pasadena, Repeal Act Voted in 1909. GOVERNMENT PROBE CAUSE. Investigation of Chemical as a Food Preservative Causes Doctors to Meditate.

PASADENA, July 12.—The American Institute of Homeopathy, which is holding its sixty-sixth annual session at Hotel Maryland this week, reversed its action taken at Detroit last year regarding the use of benzoate of soda as a preservative when a resolution was passed yesterday morning as follows: "Whereas, a resolution was adopted at the annual meeting of the American Institute of Homeopathy at Detroit, Mich., in 1909, concerning the use or non-conditional food preservatives such as benzoate of soda, which appears to be at variance with recent investigations and the official action of the national government, and also that the resolution has been quoted in the public press and elsewhere as connecting the A. I. H. to a conclusion differing with that reached by the authorities administering the pure food laws; therefore be it

Resolved, That the following resolutions are directed to be spread upon the minutes of the body: First, that the resolution of 1909 was passed in good faith, based upon the information then available and upon conclusions drawn therefrom, and second, that in view of further investigation had within the past year the A. I. H. considers the questions involved as not finally settled, and hereby repeals the action of the session of 1909."

The report of the treasurer yesterday showed a surplus of \$10,000, and the secretary reported 145 new members during the year.

CHINESE TO MAKE NEW ATTEMPT FOR FREEDOM Mills Sing's Attorney Asks Habeas Corpus Writ. Mills Sing, a Chinese, who, after testing the validity of the juvenile court act, which was sustained in a decision of the district court of appeals Saturday, is to make another attempt to obtain his liberty without trial. An application for a writ of habeas corpus was made to Presiding Judge Bordwell by Attorney George McKeeby late yesterday. The hearing will be set today. Sing is charged with contributing to the delinquency of a minor girl, a ward of the juvenile court. As grounds for his writ he claims the crime with which he is charged can be committed only by "parent or parents, legal guardian or person having custody." Inasmuch as he occupies none of these positions he demands his release. Another application for a writ of habeas corpus has been made by J. C. Woodbury. He claims he was bound over to the superior court of Justice Frederickson's court on insufficient evidence.
