

LEGG AGAIN SHINES AT MINNEAPOLIS GOLF PLAY

Stocky Yale Expert Lowers Record Made by Egan Over Exmoor Course

MINNEAPOLIS, July 26.—Sixteen golfers survived the second day's play of the tournament for the championship of the Western Golf Association. The honors were taken by Harry Legg, the stocky boy from Yale. Legg equaled his remarkable performance of yesterday when he turned in a wonderful card of 79 in the second of the 36-hole qualifying round, making a total of 140. That broke the old Western Golf Association qualifying record of 141 by H. Chandler Egan over the old Exmoor course. Charles Evans, Jr., of Edgewater, the present champion; Robert A. Gardner, the national champion, and Legg remained in the struggle. Gardner was forced to go the 18th green to defeat Addison Stillwell of Midlothian by one up. Stillwell fought hard and Gardner was unable to get better than a half in five. Among those who qualified is Walter Fairbanks, Denver, first 1876; total 75; total 151. Following are the leading cards, with Legg's, of the second half of the qualifying round: Mason Phelps, Midlothian—Out 37, in 34, total 71; Albert Seckel, Hinsdale—Out 36, in 35, total 71; Charles Evans, Jr., Edgewater—Out 37, in 35, total 72; R. A. Gardner, Midlothian—Out 38, in 35, total 73.

Pomona Officers Make Unsuccessful Attempt to Find San Bernardino Suspect

POMONA, July 26.—Although Constable Slanker and other officers have been hunting for Mrs. Nutting, alias Ella Woods, the alleged vagrant wanted in San Bernardino, she has not yet been arrested. Friday the woman with her two grandchildren was living in a house at Palomares street and Kingsley avenue, provided by the young women of the Pomona Fruit and Flower mission, upon whom she had imposed with a hard luck tale. Having received a telegram from officers at San Bernardino, telling him to be on the lookout for the woman, Constable Slanker remembered that the Fruit and Flower mission had recently befriended a woman and two children and after inquiry learned that it was none other than Mrs. Nutting. One of the mission members went to the woman and confronted her with the story, but the latter denied everything. Nevertheless when Constable Slanker called later the woman and children had departed.

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
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
