What Is Doing in Politics

MESERVE IN WAY TO FOIL ENEMIES

Republicans Claim Plot Brewed by Parker to Boost Spalding's Candidacy

FORM TWO COMBINATIONS Regulars Much Aroused by Action Contemplated at the Club Meeting Today

BY T. SHELLEY SUTTON "A pretty kettle of fish" was the expression of disgust heard frequently among machine Republicans yesterday when the report became current in political circles that the Regular Republican club of Los Angeles, which has become the chief working organization of the Parker-Herrin Southern Pacific leaders, will meet in room 114 Wilson building this afternoon, it is believed, to endorse Alden Anderson for governor, A. G. Spalding of San Diego for United States senator and Bert Farmer of Los Angeles for lieutenant governor.

This announced intention of several of the prominent members of the Regular Republican club caused a great deal of uneasiness and elicited considerable criticism yesterday. It was claimed by members of the campaign committee organized to boost the senatorial candidacy of E. A. Meserve of Los Angeles that Meserve has been "doublecrossed," that he only consented to enter the race at the urgent solicitation of Walter Parker, Charles Hardy, Jerry Burke, John Lynd and other prominent machine leaders and that now these men have determined to throw him down because A. G. Spalding, the sporting goods magnate, has since consented to enter the contest and they are much more hopeful of electing Spalding than Meserve.

Late yesterday afternoon it was rumored in political circles that it was the intention of the newly organized machine to endorse Anderson and Farmer, but it became evident that the undertone of opposition to this combination had assumed a significance which threatens to turn it into a veritable tidal wave at the meeting this afternoon, hence it was freely stated yesterday that there can be no question of the action of the regulars. With the Southern Pacific influences lined up for Anderson, Spalding and Farmer and others of the machine backing Curry, Meserve and Ferris, it would appear that the Regular Republican who thrust himself into the gubernatorial race, a man whose wishes of several leaders, will have a lonely contest at the primaries, which will be held August 1st and 2nd, and August 4th, leaving but two days, Friday and Saturday, for the election in the county. It was arranged to have Mr. Johnson speak at Los Angeles on Friday evening, Friday afternoon being the only available date for soldiers' home. This left Saturday afternoon as the only remaining open date which could be given Redondo, where we had already agreed to have a meeting. Several supporters of Meserve yesterday declared that if the Los Angeles regulars get back of Spalding, as a result of the political maneuvering, he will be the worst piece of political trickery in the history of the state, which indicates how bitter they feel about it.

One Republican leader said yesterday that the old Republican machine of other days is practically annihilated, but that the new Regular Republican club, which is expected to get back of Anderson, Spalding and Farmer, represents the leaders and chief lieutenants of the old push.

RESULT IN DOUBT The result of the meeting today is variously conjectured. Many friends of Stanton and Meserve, both of whom probably will be seriously affected by the action taken today, say that it will result in the formation of an entirely new organization to be composed of the dissatisfied rank and file of the old S. P. machine, and that this new organization, which will assume itself through the county central committee, or through a so-called club similar to the Regular Republican club, will put its strength into the fight for the nomination of Curry, Meserve and Ferris. Meserve, however, is not anxious to form an alliance with either Curry or Stanton, but as many of this dissatisfied element are friends of Stanton, it remains to be seen if this will not merely complicate the situation and add to the woes and vicissitudes of the regulars.

One of Curry's advisers stated last night that the Republicans of Los Angeles who line up for Anderson, Spalding and Farmer at the meeting today probably will come out with a strong endorsement of H. S. G. McCartney, the machine candidate for the state senate against George Sanders and Leslie Hewitt, and that they will probably endorse "Jake" Transue, Henry Lyon and Walter Leeds, machine candidates for the state assembly.
