

BRADY LEADS IN IDAHO PRIMARY

Opponents of Governor Claim Another Election Will Be Required

HAMER AHEAD FOR CONGRESS

County Option Is Main Issue with Both Parties in the State

(Associated Press) BOISE, Idaho, Aug. 30.—Idaho held her first direct primary election today.

The courts having held the second choice provision of the primary law to be mandatory, many voters wrote the names of secondary candidates upon their ballots.

Governor James H. Brady is conceded to be ahead in the race for the Republican nomination for governor, but his opponents claim a rebalot will be necessary, in which another candidate may be selected.

The liquor question has been the main question in the campaign, though both leading candidates on the Republican and Democratic tickets have declared in favor of the county option law enacted by the legislature.

CZAR AND CZARINA REACH GERMAN TERRITORY SAFELY

Streets of Friedberg Crowded When Emperor Drives Through

FRIEDBERG, Aug. 30.—Emperor Nicholas and Empress Alexandra of Russia arrived here safely today.

Their majesties were accompanied into German territory by a suite of 50 persons. Before the arrival of the imperial train great crowds gathered in the streets in hopes of having a view of the visitors.

They were not disappointed, for the emperor and empress were driven from the railway station to the castle, which they will occupy while here, in an open automobile.

The Russian secret police have been here for several days on the lookout for anarchists and at Bad Nauheim took into custody a Russian named Mandelberg last night.

REGULARS CONTROL SAN DIEGO G. O. P.

Insurgents Outnumbered Two to One in Republican County Convention

ADMINISTRATION IS INDORSED

Perkins and Flint Commended, and Support Is Pledged to Johnson

(Associated Press) SAN DIEGO, Aug. 30.—The so-called regulars were in full control of the Republican county convention which was held here today.

A. H. Sweet was chairman. Eleven delegates to the state convention were chosen. They are John D. Spreckels, chairman; Colonel A. G. Gassen, M. L. Ward, Leroy A. Wright, Sam F. Smith, G. Davidson, F. W. Jackson, F. J. Lea, J. C. Lazaire, W. C. Hillary and former Mayor John F. Forward.

The resolutions indorse in enthusiastic terms the administration of President Taft. Senators Perkins and Flint and Representative Smith are warmly commended. The support of the party is pledged to Hiram Johnson and the rest of the ticket nominated at the recent primary.

The county's delegation in the legislature is asked to work for A. G. Spalding for United States senator. The support of San Diego Republicans is pledged to the San Francisco harbor bonds and to his plans for financing them by the extension of the bond as suggested in Governor Gillett's call for a special session of the legislature.

Another resolution recommends the Chinese exclusion laws be made more stringent, and that exclusion be applied to the Japanese.

The Lincoln-Roosevelt league delegates in the convention were outnumbered by about two to one and made only two or three ineffectual attempts to accomplish anything.

A. G. Spalding, candidate for the United States senate, made a speech which was received with demonstrations of much enthusiasm.

POSTOFFICE ROBBERS ARE ROUNDED UP IN KANSAS

Banker Charged with Buying Stolen Stamps

WICHITA, Kas., Aug. 30.—Federal officers made the final roundup today of a gang of Kansas postoffice robbers whom they have been following for two years, when they arrested John Callahan, alleged leader of the gang, in this city.

Their names, William Carron and William "Blank" Ryan had been arrested previously near Wymore, Neb., at the same house where, it is said, they were engaged in preparing nitroglycerine for use on safes. Frank Williams, Smith Wilson and one other were arrested at Marysville, Kansas, last night.

The banker admits having bought some stamps from Burt and says he did not know they were stolen.

HOUSE OF LATE JOSEPH MEDILL SOLD FOR DEBT

CHICAGO, Aug. 30.—The residence of the late Joseph Medill, editor of the Chicago Tribune, a landmark on the north side, and at one time one of the finest residences in the city, yesterday went into the possession of a life insurance company by the matter in chancery's deed and the result of a foreclosure suit brought against James Donovan.

The amount of the foreclosure judgment was \$36,434, the suit having been filed one year ago and the time for redemption having expired. It was purchased from the Medill estate by Donovan.

MAN GRASPS ROPE—SAVES SELF FROM FALL OF MILE

CALUMET, Mich., Aug. 30.—One of the most remarkable escapes from death in the annals of Lake Superior copper industry occurred yesterday at the Red Jacket shaft of the Calumet & Hecla company, when Mike Sunrich, a timberman, in stepping from the repair car in the main shaft, fell 167 feet.

The man grasped the rope of the cage and saved himself from a fall of a mile to the bottom of the shaft. His hands were badly burned on the rope, but otherwise was unharmed. Sunrich was dangling from the cable when rescued.

ELECTRIC STORM PUTS OUT LIGHTS IN SAN DIEGO CITY

SAN DIEGO, Aug. 30.—Accompanied by short, heavy showers, a thunder storm of more than usual intensity passed over San Diego and vicinity about 4 o'clock this morning.

The storm lasted about an hour and electric light wires in one or two localities in this city were struck by lightning and the lights put out of commission.

The local station of the United States weather bureau this morning reported that five one-hundredths of an inch of rain had fallen.

AGREE ON PROCEDURE IN FOREST LAND CASES

Locations to Be Reported by Forester and Acted on by Land Office

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 30.—At a meeting held in Portland yesterday between officers of the field service of the general land office and officers of the forestry service an agreement was reached which gives to the general land office all responsibility for the patenting of lands on the public domain. The agreement places in effect the compact recently entered into between Secretary of the Interior Ballinger and Secretary of Agriculture Wilson respecting the rights of the two branches of the service, and in effect carries out the intent of the law of February 1, 1905.

MONTECLAIR, N. J., Aug. 30.—Charles Talbot Porter, an engineer and inventor of international reputation, is dead at his home here after a brief illness. He was 85 years old.

WILL TEST TITLES TO LAND SOLD BY INDIANS

FERGUS FALLS, Minn., Aug. 30.—Eugene H. Long, representing the federal department of justice at Washington; John H. Hinton, representing the interior department; and J. M. Dickey, assistant United States district attorney for Minnesota were here today, and announced that they proposed filing suits in equity to determine the ownership of lands in the White Earth Indian reservation. These suits will involve 760,000 acres of the reservation that the Indians have disposed of without the consent of the federal government.
