There will be a matinee today, as well as the regular matinee Saturday and Sunday. 'Strongheart,' the Indian-comedy play, will be the next Burbank piece. Wilton Lackaye, one of the most popular actors in America, comes to the Majestic next week in the new play by Cleveland Moffett, 'The Battle,' which has been nicknamed 'the play which gives the poor millionaire a chance.' Lackaye has an exceptionally strong supporting company. Roscoe Arbuckle, the fattest actor on the coast, has arrived to play the part of the fat college boy in 'Strongheart' at the Burbank, which will follow 'Salvation Nell' and which is well known in the north, but it is some time since he has been seen in Los Angeles. It is said of him that he has to pay two fares when he travels. A special matinee performance of 'The Burglar and the Lady' will be given by the Girton stock company at the grand opera house this afternoon. Frank Manning, who for many months has presided as assistant treasurer of the Los Angeles theater, and who by his genial manner has made hundreds of friends among local vaudeville patrons, has resigned his position to accept an offer from one of the big mining corporations in Arizona. Mr. Manning left for Arizona yesterday. Fresh from a year of tremendous success at the Astor theater, New York, 'Seven Days,' declared to be the funniest ever written in twenty years, comes to the Mason opera house next Monday night for a week's engagement. The possibility of humorous complications can be seen at once in the central idea, which concerns the unexpected meeting of a number of persons who do not want to see each other, who are unfortunately quarantined for a week and forced to be together. MANAGER FEARS PLAY MAY BE PROHIBITED

Crippen's Relatives Reported to Be Ready to Halt 'Tracked by Wireless'

The management of the Grand opera house and Ira C. Tichenor, the author of 'Tracked by Wireless,' are somewhat disturbed over the rumor that is going the rounds to the effect that relatives of Dr. Hawley C. Crippen would make an attempt to enjoin Manager Girton from producing 'Tracked by Wireless,' which is scheduled for its first presentation at the Grand opera house next Sunday afternoon.

Manager Girton and Mr. Tichenor, however, are both of the opinion that there is nothing contained in the play which would make a basis for such an action, although the author has followed the case very closely from the time when Dr. Crippen and his tylist disappeared from London until he was placed in the Quebec jail by Inspector Dew.

The fact that only two days ago Ethel Claire Leneve was practically cleared of being an accomplice of Dr. Crippen has not necessitated any change in the original manuscript, for the author has made her the heroine of his story and has woven an interesting and pretty romance about her and Inspector Dew.


The rehearsals and the work of building the scenic production have been under way for over two weeks and the stage settings are now complete. Chester Stevens has been selected to play
