JOHNSTONE SETS RECORDS

Birdman in Wright Biplane Remains Above Earth at Atlantic Three Hours

BOSTON, Sept. 12.—One world's and two American records were broken by the flier at the Harvard-Boston race meet today. Ralph Johnstone, in a Wright biplane, made new marks in accuracy, duration and distance events.

An achievement no less meritorious was a flight by Claude Grahame-White of England, in which he went twice to Boston light and return, a distance of thirty-three miles, in 34:01.1-5, or almost a mile a minute for the entire distance. He used a Blériot monoplane.

BOSTON, Sept. 12.—The weather today was ideal for navigating the air at the Harvard-Boston aviation meet at Atlantic, but during the early hours only one of the amateur aviators ascended.

Ralph Johnstone, in a Wright biplane, today broke all American records for duration at the Harvard-Boston aviation meet, remaining in the air three hours five minutes and forty-four seconds. In landing he broke the world's record for accuracy, dropping a distance of 100 inches from the center of the circle.

COURT'S PLANS LONG FLIGHT

With his racing biplane now equipped with a new sixty-five horse power motor and a Burgess propeller, Glenn H. Curtiss expected today to attempt the Boston light flight for the first time. Up to this time no one has tried to better the time of forty minutes one and three-fifths seconds made in this event by Grahame-White in his racing Blériot monoplane.

To demonstrate the availability of the airship as an accessory in war, Lieutenant J. E. Fickel, U. S. A., went up in a Curtiss biplane, operated by Charles F. Willard, today, and shot at targets about the field. Fickel used the regulation army rifle and fired while the biplane was in a steep climb of thirty miles an hour 400 feet above the field.
