Mrs. Donovan Sent to Jail for Contempt in Police Case

Patrolman Fitzgerald, the arresting officer, was on the stand testifying against Mrs. Donovan.

"I was walking under her window when she threw a slop jar of water on me," said the officer.

"You're a liar," exclaimed Mrs. Donovan in loud tones.

She was told to be quiet and the hearing continued, but not for long.

When Fitzgerald started to testify against Mrs. Donovan, she again raised her voice and again another outburst of indignation was heard.

"Be quiet or I shall have to send you to jail for contempt of court," said Judge Williams.

Mrs. Donovan would not be quiet and she was punished.

COME TO BLOWS FOLLOWING DISPUTE OVER PROPERTY

L. C. Crossman Claims R. N. Roberts Clubbed Him with Gun

In an altercation over the title to property situated at 2969 Frances avenue, in the fashionable Wilshire residence district, yesterday morning L. C. Crossman, a real estate dealer, and R. N. Roberts of Long Beach, came to blows.

Crossman says he is the rightful owner of the property and that he gave Roberts a trust deed some time ago, but which has been settled. Crossman recently brought suit to quiet his title in the superior court.

When he returned to the house, he discovered Roberts in possession. When he attempted to enter, he alleges, Roberts pointed a revolver at him and threatened to shoot.

Crossman thrust it aside and succeeded in wresting it from Roberts only after Roberts had dealt him several blows on the head with the butt end of the weapon.

After securing the revolver, Crossman released Roberts and went to the receiving hospital to have his injuries treated. He stated he would have a charge of assault filed against Roberts.

Roberts claims that he has a lien on the property in dispute and that he was only protecting his rights when he struck Crossman.

ADD PAY-AS-YOU-ENTER CAR TO SPRING STREET

Railway Will Operate New Type of Conveyance in City's Business Section

The first pay-as-you-enter type of street cars to be operated in Spring street and through the busier section of the city will begin running Sunday morning, according to an announcement made yesterday by officials of the Los Angeles Railway company.

The new type of cars will be substituted for those in service on the West Ninth street line, and the showing they make in regard to fast time per hour, ease of utility through the business section will be watched with interest by the company officials, as it will be the first real trout the new type of cars have had in the crowded sections of the city.

With the starting of pay-as-you-enter cars another new device will be installed. This is an automatic switch-stalling device, which will be in operation at Ninth and Figueroa streets.

The new device is so arranged that a car approaching within the electric power on more than one point will not take the switch but proceed along the straight track. If, however, the car's speed is less than ten miles per hour, the one-point switch will automatically throw itself and allow the slow car to round the corner.

The device has been given a series of experimental tests and has proved satisfactory. It is believed that it will prove of value in averting accidents, as a car cannot take the switch when running at such speed as would make it possible for it to jump the track when rounding a curve.

Such a device as this was absolutely necessary, according to officials of the railway, because of the large number of cars which could be put in operation on any lines where switching is done. On the new cars it is required that conductors remain at the rear of their cars in order to collect fares and they have no time to go forward and attend to switching.

That the pay-as-you-enter cars have been successful on the Central avenue line, where they have been in operation more than two months, is the statement of officials of the railway company.

The new cars prevent many accidents, make fare and transfer controversies between passengers and conductors practically unknown, and do not, as at first feared, demand a slower running schedule for their operation.

The cars now in operation over the Ninth street line will be sent to the new type of cars, after which they will be placed in operation on some other line.

THIEVES STEAL JEWELRY BUT OVERLOOK DIAMOND

While Richard J. Culver was absent from his apartments in the Hotel Minnewaska, Second and Olive streets, Wednesday evening, a pass key thief entered and stole four stick pins valued at \$50.

The thief overlooked a valuable diamond stick pin which was in the dresser. Miss C. W. Kohler of the same address reported that her room was entered and \$40 stolen. Both reports were made to the detectives yesterday.

FORMER OFFICER KILLS WOMAN AND ENDS LIFE

GLOBE, Ariz., Sept. 15.—Scott New, a former member of the Douglas police force, shot and fatally wounded his sweetheart, Jennie Catalina, today and then committed suicide.

He fired a charge of shot full in the young woman's face. She died six hours later. New shot himself in the head and died almost instantly.

Jealousy is said to have been the cause of the tragedy.

TWO BOYS CHARGED WITH BURGLARIZING A ROOM

Tony Aborlasid, aged 14, and his 13-year-old brother, Louis, were booked at central police headquarters last evening on a burglary charge. They were accused by Detectives Rich and Roberts with having burglarized a room at 446 1/2 Wall street.

The officers claim that the lads were assisted by a boy named Frank Rice. A suit of clothes and a suit case was taken from the room. The Aborlasid brothers were turned over to Probation Officer McLaughlin and are being held at the detention home, pending their appearance in the juvenile court.
