NEW TRINITY EDIFICE TO COST NEAR \$100,000

Plans Being Made for Methodist Church South at Twelfth and Flower

Extensive plans are being made for the erection of the new Trinity Methodist church, South, at the corner of Twelfth and Flower streets. The structure will cost nearly \$100,000, the lot being valued at \$50,000.

The church will be in the southern classic style. The main entrance will be made from a full porch in the center of the building. A vestibule on either side will lead to the main auditorium, affording good ventilation and at the same time preventing a draught.

ARRANGEMENT OF INTERIOR All parts of the auditorium and the Sunday school rooms, which, when thrown together, will have a seating capacity of 2500 persons, will be in full view of the pulpit. The choir loft will be at one side of the pulpit.

Memorial windows will be used throughout the church. Many of the members have made application for spaces. The dome, forty feet in diameter, with interior finish in art glass, will be directly above the main auditorium. It will contain eighteen memorial windows.

There will be a nursery opening above the primary department of the Sunday school room, where parents may leave their children during services.

FINE EXAMPLE OF ARCHITECTURE The Rev. R. P. Howell is pastor of this church, which will have one of the finest buildings in the city. The new site, selected after considerable thought on the part of the officers, will bring the church within the reach of the large residential district of the southwestern section.

DR. LOCKE FLAYS MEN WHO WAR ON SOCIETY

First Methodist Church Pastor Says Nation Requires More Stringent Laws

"There are no words that can be found that are sufficient to denounce and deprecate the terrible Times foul deed are human demons. In all probability they are notorious criminals. The diabolical crime will not be laid at the door of honest organized labor. It is to be earnestly hoped that these men will soon be overtaken and swiftly punished. These pious incarnate are arch-traitors to liberty and life. No home, or institution is safe while these red-handed villains are at liberty."

These were the forceful words of Dr. Charles Edward Locke of the First Methodist church last evening. He preached to a congregation which crowded the building on the subject "The Tragedy of the Dynamite Bomb, or Lessons of the Hour for Patriots." Dr. Locke's text was Judges 21, 25: "In those days there was no king in Israel; every man did that which was right in his own eyes."

ARCH-ENEMIES OF SOCIETY "There was great moral confusion among the children of Israel in those days when there was no moral standard. Disgraceful atrocities were committed and submerging evils cursed the people. Good order and high ideals require that moral standards should be set up and diligently regarded and maintained. That man is an arch-enemy of society whose hand is raised against law and authority."

"I was absent from home when there came the shocking intelligence of the terrific explosion which hurled a score of industrious men into eternity and destroyed the Los Angeles Times building. In behalf of this great congregation I wish to extend assurances of tenderest sympathy to those who have been so suddenly and cruelly bereft by this awful tragedy and also to assure the owners of the Times of our sincere regrets because of the immense losses they have sustained."

"The leaders and teachers of anarchy are responsible for this frightful tragedy. This is a part of the harvest which is being gathered after years of sowing. Anarchy has led to these unutterable depths of depravity, and has inspired this deed of violence which not only destroyed property, but sacrificed a score of useful lives, and has sent billows of tumultuous sorrow over many happy homes in this community."

SEVERE LAWS ARE NEEDED "As a nation we are learning a sad and bitter lesson. We have been endeavoring to suppress dangerous public utterances in this land of free speech. The vicious acts of these murderers is the logical consequence of the incendiary and irresponsible trades of loud-mouthed anarchists. If a man sets fire to your home, he is arrested and imprisoned. If a man destroys property, he should be fined. Our watchword must be anarchy. They are greater dangers than the bubonic plague, and every suspect should be arrested and quarantined. Eternal vigilance is the price of liberty."

Dr. Locke referred with much feeling to the hope of immortality. He also emphasized the necessity of each person living every day so as to be ready to go suddenly into the presence of his Maker. He discussed, also, the punishment of criminals and favored the indeterminate sentence. He said when a man became a criminal he should be kept in prison for months, or years, until he had given evidence that he was wholly reformed.

The "insurgency" movement is not going to hurt the Republican party. It will help it, rather. It will result in a much needed cleansing and an awakening along lines that needed new ideas and new blood. It will also, in the end, get rid of some undesirable, who will go to the Democratic party, where they belong.

PREDICTS EARLY FALL OF WORLD PLUTOCRACY

Reynold Blight Declares Day of Broader Humanity and Idealism Is Coming

"All over the world the battle against special privilege and it is a winning fight," declared Reynold E. Blight, minister of the Los Angeles Fellowship, at Blanchard hall, yesterday morning, speaking in a prelude on "All Europe Going Republican."

"In America it is a clean cut struggle between plutocracy and democracy; in Europe it takes the form of opposition to the extravagant claims of monarchy and aristocracy and the cupidity of ecclesiasticism. The channels of the news are censored by the reactionaries, and we in America have little knowledge of the undercurrent of the sentiment and revolutionary action until we are startled by a political and social upheaval such as we have witnessed this past week in Portugal. The throne, which is not a sudden explosion of an oppressed people's wrath, but the logical climax of education, agitation and long years of repression, is a coup that startles the world is the result of careful planning."

EUROPE ALL REPUBLICAN "It is only a matter of time when the last European dynasty shall fall and the whole continent shall become a group of republics. The thrones, founded on bloodshed, intrigue and crime, are tottering. Only the bayonets and guns of the military prevent the universal rule of the people. But the masses are becoming conscious of their strength, and even the armies are becoming honeycombed with dissatisfaction with present conditions, and the guns will be used for liberty instead of despotism."

"Russia is ablaze with revolution; Germany is in revolution. We are being in her history, and no one doubts that just beginning a struggle with the church that will be historic. England faces one of the most significant crises in her history, and no one doubts that fundamental democracy will triumph. Even Turkey is groping towards liberty and enlightenment."

SPECIAL PRIVILEGE DWINDES "We in America are passing through a period of revolution. We are being reborn again. We are obliterating ancient lines of cleavage and making the old shibboleth absurd. The powers of special privilege, of greed and chicanery, and of money and big business, will never again exercise as wide a sway as in days gone by. The day of a more splendid democracy, of a larger humanity, of a nobler life is being dawning. Arise, sons of men, salute the morning!"
