IMPROVEMENTS PLANNED IN RECEIVING HOSPITAL. The work of enlarging the receiving hospital at First and Hill streets has progressed rapidly during the past week. When alterations are completed it will include the room previously occupied by Judge Williams as a court. With the additional room Police Surgeon Dr. Charles E. Zerling will be given a private office. A reception room for visitors and relatives of injured persons taken to the hospital for treatment will be fitted up. There will be a separate ward for infants and alcohol patients, who heretofore have been placed in the same ward as other patients. A diet kitchen will be installed in the new quarters, as well as a chemical laboratory. At present the hospital has no way of feeding patients should they desire to remain in the hospital over night. The hospital will also be fitted with a dark room for X-ray examinations and X-ray plates and microscopic work.

Furniture for the additional room has been purchased and will be installed as soon as the work of remodeling the hospital is completed. Several hundred dollars' worth of instruments, including patent sterilizers, have been purchased by the city.
