

EXPERTS TO TALK ON CITY PLANNING

Conference to Open Here Tomorrow Will Consider Upbuilding of Municipalities

MANY WOMEN INTERESTED

Housing of Poor to Be One of the Important Questions to Receive Attention

City planning from every possible viewpoint will be discussed this week when delegates will be here to consider general plans for the upbuilding of cities of the southwest. This scheme, of which Dana Bartlett spoke last spring before the Civic association, is proving remarkably interesting to outsiders, and delegates from many cities of the southwest will participate in the conference. While only delegates may vote, it is understood that any interested persons may have the floor with the privilege of speaking.

The conference will be held in the new hall, 618 New High street, and will open tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock. The complete program has been published by The Herald. Tomorrow's program follows:

"The purpose of the conference is to get ideas," said Dr. Bartlett. "These ideas may assist the commission on city planning which the mayor is soon to appoint. One of the features of city planning to which we must give much consideration is the housing of the poor. Thomas Fellows has worked out a plan of concrete construction, and a model of one of his houses will be on exhibition at the conference."

New High street, where the conference is to be held, is in the rear of the Plaza church, and any street car passing the Plaza will reach it.

CLERK ARRESTED AFTER FLIGHT AROUND HORN
NEW YORK, Nov. 12.—After a flight from San Francisco and a trip around the Horn on a tramp steamer, Robert Malone, former confidential clerk and bookkeeper for the Metropolitan Light and Power company of San Francisco, was arrested near the Brooklyn bridge this afternoon.

The police say Malone confessed to his peculations and ascribed his downfall to fast living. He seemed indifferent to his fate.

Malone was sent to the Anglo-California bank in San Francisco to deposit \$4000, but instead went on a jaunt through California and, returning to San Francisco, boarded a steamer for New York. The prisoner is 23 years old. He reached New York three days ago.

SAN FRANCISCO MAN ARRESTED FOR SHORTAGE
SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 12.—Robert A. Malone, who was arrested today in New York, came to this city in the summer of 1909, and on the strength of recommendations from the east was given employment as assistant cashier of the Metropolitan Light and Power company.

Early in February last he failed to report for duty and an examination of his books revealed, it is alleged, a shortage of more than \$3000. A detective will be sent east to bring him back for trial.
