

WOMEN TO SEEK COIN FOR Y.W.C.A.

One Hundred Fair Canvassers Will Start Subscription Campaign Today

\$40,000 DEBT TO BE CLEARED

Contributors Are to Be Asked for \$100 Each—Requests to Be Telephoned

With a band of one hundred women to canvass the city today for \$100 subscriptions, every effort will be put forth by the Young Women's Christian association to bring down the outstanding debt of \$40,000 to the zero mark. The city will be well covered by the solicitors, but the telephoning will be put to use and many subscriptions, it is expected, will be taken over the wire. Between 4:30 and 5 o'clock a rally will be held at the association building and reports will be turned in.

The campaign today is under the management of Mrs. Giles Kellogg. Buttons have been provided for the workers, and each person canvassing will be expected to wear one. Many other women who have been quietly working for the fund during the campaign of the present month will also make reports at the meeting this evening, and an enthusiastic gathering is expected by those in charge.

This movement was started by Mrs. W. J. Chichester, who is now at the head of the committee. This committee is still endeavoring to fill the list which it is confident of doing before Christmas.

At the time the movement was launched to raise the money, in 1907, it was believed that the indebtedness of the building could be cleared away within a short time. During the construction, however, it was seen by the rapid increase in membership that the building as planned would not be large enough, and another story was added, with other costly parts which ran the cost of construction up much more than was formerly anticipated. The association now has more than 6000 members.

COMMITTEE WORKS TO ABOLISH LAW'S DELAYS

Bar Association Receives Report Advocating Code Revision to Lessen Technicalities

Important changes in California laws, criminal and civil, are suggested in a report to the Los Angeles Bar association, made yesterday by a committee appointed for that purpose and consisting of Oscar C. Mueller, Walter R. Leeds, Wheaton A. Gray, Walter F. Hans and W. O. Morton. The committee suggests that the Los Angeles association co-operate with the San Francisco Bar association and the state association and that a concerted effort be made to have the amendments suggested enacted at the next session of the legislature.

In general the amendments submitted are designed to make the operation and administration of the law a more simple matter than it now is; to minimize the importance of legal technicalities and to make the divorce laws more rigorous.

THE AMENDMENTS ADVOCATED

1. Adding to the sections of the code provisions to prevent persons from seeking an appointment of notary or deputy sheriff for the purpose of evading jury duty.
2. Requiring attorneys coming from other states to take an examination if they have not practiced for three years in the state in which they were admitted.
3. Simplifying the method of proceeding with the hearing of new trials. This, it is claimed, will result in lessening the cost of litigation and reducing many delays to a minimum.
4. The enactment of a statute providing for the appointment of medical expert witnesses by the court.
5. Changing the laws relating to depositions by requiring all of them to be taken by oral examination and not by written interrogatories.
6. Changing many sections of the penal code so that frivolous technicalities cannot be taken advantage of, particularly relating to indictment and the examination of grand jurors, and the repeal of that portion of the penal code providing for the service on the defendant of a copy of the testimony taken before the grand jury.
7. An amendment to the constitution providing that three-fourths of a jury can render a verdict in both civil and criminal cases, excepting in those cases where the death penalty or penalty of life imprisonment may be pronounced by the court.
8. A change in the laws relating to divorce, making it necessary for the

CITY GROWS TOO FAST FOR ENGINEER'S OFFICE

Los Angeles Realty Board Suggests Plan for Catching Up with Street Work

Outside help for the engineering department without cost to the city is to be provided if the council adopts a plan suggested yesterday by the Los Angeles Realty board.

A resolution embodying the board's suggestion was introduced by Councilman Andrews, and at his suggestion referred to a joint meeting of the legislation and supply committees. These committees will meet Saturday morning to consider the matter.

The resolution provides that the city engineer be authorized and instructed to accept the services of engineers outside the engineering department who will do the work necessary for the improvement of tracts of land to be placed on the market and who will be paid by the tract owners.

W. M. Garland, president of the Los Angeles Realty board, said if this solution of the congestion in the engineering department were adopted much improvement work would be done immediately. He said that the engineer was nearly a year behind in street improvements, not from any blame attached to the engineering department but because of the rapid growth of the city and the large number of new tracts that are laid out, all demanding street work.

"The engineering department is doing the best it can, but the city has outgrown the system employed," said Mr. Garland. "A system should be instituted that would divide the engineer's department into departments of itself, such as paving, street opening and widening, sewers and others, and one man should be placed in charge of each department."

The supply committee has been trying to find some means to give the engineer more help, but more help cannot be provided without more room, as the quarters are cramped.

President Lusk and several members of the council declared they were in hearty sympathy with the plan, and unless unexpected opposition is encountered from the city engineer it will, in all probability, be adopted.

AQUEDUCT BUREAU REQUEST CURTAILED \$8000 BY CITY

The city's legal department believes the power and harbor bonds will be ready for sale by January 1, according to a report made to the council by W. J. Washburn, chairman of the finance committee.

With this expectation the council yesterday appropriated but \$2996 for the electrical bureau of the aqueduct for the preliminary work of power development. The bureau had asked for \$10,000 for the next five months, but the finance committee concluded that \$2996 would carry it through December and the bond money would be ready after that.

\$10,000,000 CONCERN BUYS DOMESTIC GAS

Pacific Light and Power Subsidiary Corporation Will Lay High Pressure Mains

A subsidiary corporation of the Pacific Light and Power corporation, under the name of the Southern California Gas company, has been formed, which will take over the Domestic Gas company and, it is said, will construct high pressure gas mains throughout Southern California, supplying many towns with gas. The new corporation has a capitalization of \$10,000,000.

The first work will be the construction of a high pressure main south of Slauson avenue to supply the outlying districts south of the city limits. Other work planned includes high pressure mains to supply Pomona, Ontario, San Bernardino, Riverside and Redlands. Besides this outlying work it is stated that a network of mains and lines will be laid in the southern portion of Los Angeles, completely supplying that district.

In the incorporation papers name the following as directors: A. C. Johnson, Charles Forman, A. N. Kemp, E. R. Davis and H. Baumgartner. This board has already voted \$10,000,000 worth of bonds to carry on the work planned.
