

HENEY CLEARING UP FRAUD CASES

Charges Against Binger Herrmann Dismissed—Sorenson and Others to Be Tried

(Associated Press)

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 22.—All charges against Binger Herrmann, former ex-congressman and former commissioner of the general land office, growing out of the Oregon land fraud indictments, were dismissed in the federal courts today by Judge Wolvorton, on motion of Francis J. Heney, government special prosecutor.

Willard N. Jones, the timber dealer and political worker, was sentenced to serve four months in the county jail and pay a fine of \$10,000. The primary sentence imposed upon Jones was one year in the Oregon state penitentiary and a fine of \$200.

George Sorenson, and a few others charged in the primary indictments will have to stand trial again as the charges against them were explicitly kept on the docket today.

Some of the defendants in what is known as the Blue Mountain case were not dismissed, the charges against Binger Herrmann in this connection being selected from the others.

Mr. Heney made no recommendations as to Franklin Pierce Mays, whose case is now up to the point of filing the mandate of the circuit court of appeals.

All of the defamations of character cases, in which John H. Hall, George Sorenson, Charles P. Lord, Henry H. Ford and others were arraigned for obstructing the way of justice, were wiped from the docket.

COURT SUSPENDS ROSS ESTATE ADMINISTRATRIX

Heirs Allege Sister of Decedent Is Planning to Claim Title to Bulk of Estate

Judge Bordwell of the superior court yesterday temporarily suspended Mrs. Anna M. Scanlon from the office of administratrix of the estate of her sister, Mrs. Elizabeth Ross, who founded a public library in Sierra Madre. The estate is valued at \$77,473.

The judicial action was the result of complaints of heirs of Mrs. Ross to the effect that Mrs. Scanlon and her son, R. E. R. Scanlon, are planning to claim as theirs Pasadena property which is valued at \$70,000 and which comprises the bulk of the estate.

For several days, Mrs. Scanlon's opponents said, they have been trying to find her in order to serve her with a citation to appear in court to show cause why she should not be removed entirely from the office of administratrix, and the temporary removal followed, the provision being made that she shall have a hearing soon in the probate court.

Another complaint against Mrs. Scanlon is the allegation that she refuses to account for money she has received to account for money she has received in conjunction with Milton K. Young, a fellow administratrix.

Mrs. Scanlon and her son went to visit Mrs. Ross in Pasadena and found the latter gradually losing her mind. Mrs. Scanlon succeeded in having herself appointed a guardian of her sister. It is asserted, despite the opposition of Mrs. Ross' foster daughter, Maggie Steinberger.

GERMANY SENTENCES 2 ENGLISHMEN AS SPIES British Officers Admit Their Guilt and Each Gets Four Years' Term

LEIPSI, Germany, Dec. 22.—Capt. Bernhard Frederick Trench of the British Royal Marine infantry and Lieut. Vivian H. Brandon of the British Royal navy were found guilty today of espionage on the German fortifications at Borkum and were sentenced each to four years' imprisonment in a fortress.

The British spies were arrested at Borkum August 22 and 23. Brandon is a brother-in-law of Sir William Bull, M. P.

Trench is a grandson of Lord Ashington and a descendant of Archbishop Trent. When arrested both admitted frankly they had come to Germany to collect information which they intended to hand over to the German government. This admission was repeated at the trial yesterday.

Today's proceedings were not public and consisted chiefly of the introduction of expert military testimony. When apprehended, it is alleged, the men were taking flashlight pictures of the fortifications at Borkum and they also had taken photographs of the defenses in course of construction on the island of Wangeroog, in the North sea, near the entrance to Jado bay.

The spies made a favorable impression by the candid admissions and it had been expected that in the event of their conviction they would receive light sentences.

Lieut. Siegfried Holm, a German army officer, who was arrested charged with having made sketches of the British fortifications in Portsmouth harbor, pleaded guilty on November 11 and was placed under bonds of \$1250 not to repeat the offense. On December 13 the supreme court of this city sentenced two brothers named Glor to two years and six months penal servitude for espionage. On the same day a French officer, Capt. Lux, was arrested at Friederichshafen, as a suspected spy.

U. S. ARMY IN PURSUIT OF REBELLIOUS MANOBOS Perpetrators of Outrages on Planters Being Punished

MANILA, Dec. 22.—The army is energetically pursuing the rebellious Manobos tribesmen in Mindanao islands. Troops of the Second cavalry are punishing the perpetrators of the outrages on the planters in the Davao district.

Brig. Gen. Pershing, commanding the department of Mindanao, has arrived here and assumed command of the army of the Philippines, pending the arrival of the recently appointed commander, Maj. Gen. Bell.

MAN KILLED IN RUNAWAY HANFORD, Dec. 22.—Aaron L. Dick, a middle-aged farmer, who came here recently from Oregon, was almost decapitated today when he was thrown from a hay wagon, struck on a barbed wire fence and was dragged several feet by a runaway team. His wind-pipe and jugular vein were severed, causing instant death.
