MILITARY ORDER OF GENERAL SICKLES' HEADQUARTERS, SECOND MILITARY DISTRICT, NORTH CAROLINA AND SOUTH CAROLINA, COLUMBIA, S. C., MARCH 21st, 1867.

General Orders, No. 1. 1. In compliance with General Orders, No. 10, Headquarters of the Army, March 11th, 1867, the undersigned hereby assumes command of the Second Military District constituted by the Act of Congress, Public Law No. 68, 2nd March, 1867, entitled "An Act for the more efficient government of the rebel States."

2. In the execution of the duty of the Commanding General to maintain the security of the inhabitants in their persons and property, to suppress insurrection, disorder and violence, and to punish or cause to be punished all disturbers of the public peace and criminals, the local civil tribunals will be permitted to take jurisdiction of all civil cases, excepting such cases as may be by the order of the Commanding General referred to a commission or other military tribunal for trial.

3. The civil government of this District is provisional only, and in all respects subject to the paramount authority of the United States, at any time to abolish, modify, control or supersede the same. Local laws and municipal regulations not inconsistent with the Constitution and laws of the United States, or the proclamations of the President, or with such regulations as are or may be prescribed in the orders of the Commanding General, are hereby declared to be in force, and to continue in force, until they are superseded, and civil officers are hereby authorized to continue the exercise of their proper functions, and will be respected and obeyed by the inhabitants.
