SOLONS FLOCK TO WASHINGTON

Representatives and Senators Arriving for Next Session of Congress

Washington, D. C., Nov. 21.—That another session of Congress is almost here is brought home to us by the arrival of Senators and Representatives daily, to get settled for the winter, and to attend the various matters of interest to their constituents.

With the President and his Cabinet back from their summer wanderings, things have taken on a lively aspect around the White House. The President is reported to be hard at work on his message to Congress, and it is understood that the Secretary of the Interior is acting as his chief advisor on this matter. That Mr. Fisher is a conservationist, and that he spent some time in Alaska last summer, seem to be the grounds for the belief that he will make some radical recommendations, which the President will adopt, for the disposal of public lands, including "natural resources, in the United States and also in the Territory of Alaska.

Congressman Needham of California, was one of the first of the far Western members to put in an appearance. He has been watching the progress of the investigation by the Rensen Referee Board of the use of sulphur in curing fruit, in which his constituents are much interested, as they claim it is possible to cure fruit properly without making use of the sulphur process. He is also prepared to make a hard fight to keep the tariff on agricultural products unimpaired. He claims that without the reasonable tariff now existing on the products of California fields and orchards, the people of his state would suffer irreparable loss. Congressman Needham is also interested in the resolution granting official recognition of the San Diego Exposition. At the special session last summer he helped to secure the passage of this resolution in the House. It is now before the Senate and has excellent prospects of being passed. The bill authorizing and requesting the President to invite the nations of Mexico, Central and South America to make exhibits at the Panama-California International Exposition at San Diego in 1917. There is believed to be no opposition to the passage of this bill in the Senate.

What Will Congress Do?
Opinion as to the net results of the coming session of Congress vary not a little. Some of the statesmen already in Washington believe that Congress will pass practically no legislation. It is not very probable that Congress will transact very much business, as both parties will probably feel disposed to go ahead with much caution on the eve of a big political campaign in order to make as few mistakes as possible. The currency will receive a good deal of attention and an effort will be made to adopt the Aldrich plan for a central bank. The Democrats are disposed to abolish the Commerce Court, which they accuse of being too strongly biased in favor of the transportation interests. They declare unequivocally that they have "got its seat" as the sporting editors say. The advocates of waterway improvement will try to have a definite policy adopted, and the trust busters are due for a lot of anti-corporation talk.

Economy the Slogan.
Wherever the industrious legislator turns at the coming session, he is likely to run into the slogan of economy in national expenditures. Army posts and navy yards are to be abolished by consolidation, and appropriations for new public buildings, for waterways, for the conduct of the public business, and for everything else connected with the Government are to be held down as close as possible. This cry for economy has even prevented the consideration in the Army Appropriation bill of any expenditure for the fortifying of Los Angeles Harbor, for which land has been bought and which is the only important strategic point on the Pacific Coast not already provided with defenses. The President is determined to keep on the program of economy, and the Democrats will have to get pretty busy, the President's advisors think, if they succeed in showing greater solicitude for the public purse than the Administration does. But this is all very distressing to the hard-working Congressmen who are anxious to help their districts with the aid of public funds.

STORM IS HOST TO COMMERCE CHAMBER

Twelve were in attendance at the weekly luncheon of the Board of Directors of the Amarillo Chamber of Commerce yesterday as guests of J. C. Storm, at the Hotel Amarillo. The discussions were informal, including reference to the proposed establishment in Amarillo of a creamery, by E. A. Chapman of Muskogee, Oklahoma, a test irrigation scheme, ways and means looking to operating the Panhandle Packing company and other matters.

The creamery proposition was passed into the hands of the industrial committee, and conference arranged with the members of the same for Mr. Chapman. It is believed that Mr. Chapman will remain over several days in order to look the more thoroughly into the need for some such plant as he has under consideration.

Discussing irrigation, it was determined that members of the board shall meet and discuss the subject, all present expressing great faith in possibilities of increasing the yield of lands in the vicinity of Amarillo by means of applying water to them. This matter has been under consideration for some time, and it seems probable that definite action will soon be taken.

Regarding the operation of the Panhandle Packing company's plant, it was stated that N. S. McGee of this city, in consideration of a certain amount of stock, the exact sum to be determined later, will undertake the task of continuously running the establishment for a year. It was shown at the meeting that a considerable amount of this stock has been tendered D. C. Priddy, who has the collection in charge, and still other shares are to be collected looking to the proposed operation. A statement was made tending to show that what is to be done must be accomplished quickly, as the optional offer of Mr. McGee is not of indefinite standing. The fact that stock is readily tendered to Mr. Priddy carries evidence of genuineness of desire for operation upon the part of the stockholders. There was notable absence in the list of those tendering stock, however, of the heavier owners of this paper, which brought forth some comment from members of the board.

Discussion of minor matters was indulged, following which a unanimous vote of thanks was tendered to the host, and statement was made by T. W. Brazelton that he will entertain in the same establishment one week hence.

PEOPLE'S POWER LEAGUE IN TEXAS

The following press dispatch was recently sent out of Austin and will be found interesting to those who are just now paying attention to political-governmental reforms:

The People's Power League of Texas was organized temporarily in this city Thursday night, but the rest of the meeting was not made public until today. Its literature sets forth the following:

"The object of the organization shall be, primarily, to bring about at the earliest possible moment the adoption of an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing for the use of the initiative, referendum and recall, and later to prepare and present proposed legislation for which there is popular demand; to disseminate correct information regarding same; to undertake the preparation of the required petitions, and, in general, to provide the machinery necessary to the most comprehensive use of the principles of direct legislation."

Temporary officers elected are all of Austin, as follows: Fred A. Scott, president; Harry M. White, secretary, and W. H. Cullen, treasurer. As soon as 500 members are obtained permanent organization will be effected. Secretary White said today the league now has about 150 members in San Antonio, Dallas, Houston, Fort Worth and Galveston. It proposes mass meetings throughout the State educational of the plans of the government, in which membership will be increased and signatures to its petitions obtained. With permanent organization it will petition the Democratic Executive Committee to place the proposed amendment to the Constitution on the ballot in the next primary.

The league was formed as a non-political, non-partisan force, for measures, not for men, and to this end its constitution will embody a prohibition against the use of its mem-
